

## Expenditures Relief Down; Hew to Budget

Washington county relief committee was forced to hold their relief load down last month to keep within their funds and therefore spent less than in August, according to the regular monthly general assistance report compiled at the local relief office.

During September 136 cases received a total of \$1,329.44 compared to the 186 cases in August, which cost the county \$1,862.21, the report shows. There were 496 persons assisted in August with 374 helped in September. These persons are accounted for in the case listings.

The local relief office, under the direction of Ann D. Kellogg, aided 411 families in August and 315 in September.

"We have been making very rigid investigations before giving any financial aid," Mrs. Kellogg declared. "No relief will be given by this office before first investigating the case in question."

A glance at the county's expenditures for January, one of the busiest months as far as relief is concerned, shows that \$4,471.87 was spent in caring for 1,587 persons. Multnomah county during that month expended \$128,854.27 to the relief expenditure list. For August, this heavily populated county spent \$91,103.02 in aiding 11,555 persons.

A total of \$170,566.88 was spent for relief by Oregon's 26 counties compared to \$115,912.71 given out during the same month in 1937. Last year 14,678 were helped in August, while 8,762 more or a total of 23,440 were in the relief rolls for August of this year.

Neil Mitchell was arrested near Beaverton Saturday night for reckless driving and is slated to appear in justice court Friday morning.

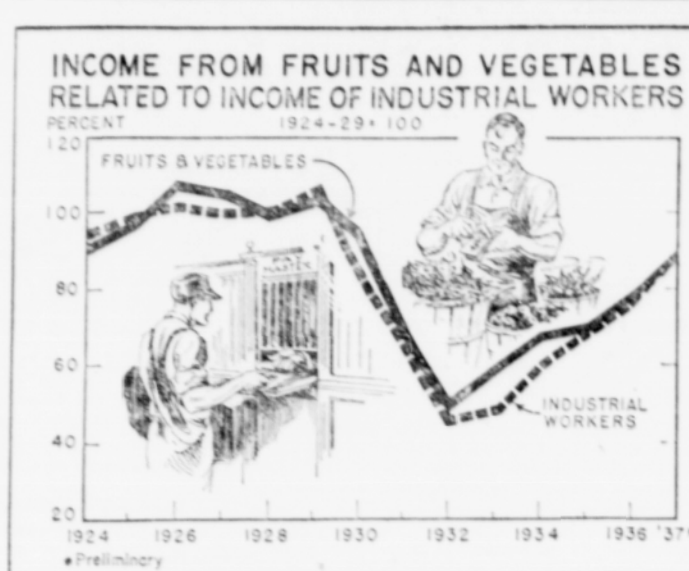
**Hare Speaker**
