

14 Burglaries Cleared Up By Confession

Fourteen house burglaries in Beaverton and vicinity were cleared from the Washington county sheriff's record Wednesday morning following the confession of the firemen and Sheriff's deputies Cornelius and Ireland of Erven Barber, 17-year-old Beaverton youth.

Barber confessed to the series of house prowling after he was caught illegally entering the residence of Cecil Barnes, fifth and Hall streets, Beaverton, Tuesday night. Sheriff's officers said all loot involved in the 14 cases would be immediately traced and confiscated for return to owners.

Sheriff J. W. Connell said Wednesday credit for Barber's arrest must go to the Beaverton firemen, who have been working steadily in co-operation with deputies, to bring Beaverton's long series of burglaries to an end. Officers said Barber had not been linked with any of recent robberies in this city.

Schulmerichs Robbed
Gaining entrance through an unlocked bedroom window, prowlers ransacked the B. C. Schulmerich residence at Elbert avenue and West Jackson street Wednesday evening and escaped with two valuable rings and 90 cents in cash. Tracks led from the window, through which the prowlers entered the house, indicated they were two of them, a deputy sheriff's report said.

Berdlyn Matteson, 234 E. Baseline, reported prowlers evidently were loitering in her back yard between 11 and 11:30 p. m. Wednesday. Investigating sheriff's found no footprints but a clothes line was broken and an aerial wire strung loosely over the line had been moved.

J. T. Tate reported his car was prowled while parked on Main street in front of the Pastime between 6 p. m. and 1 a. m. Friday night. Removed were one set of socket wrenches and two sets of end wrenches.

E. E. Coulter, Sixth and Angel, Beaverton, reported marauders entered his house between 6:30 and 11 p. m. Sunday but nothing was found missing. Sheriff's deputies here believed the thief or thieves were only interested in cash, inasmuch as they left several valuable articles in plain sight. Fingerprints were found on the window through which entrance was made.

Portlander Fined
Neil Mitchell, Portland, was fined \$25 and costs on a reckless driving charge in front of the Beaverton justice court last Saturday, a record in the county sheriff's office shows.

Raymond O'Dell, Hillsboro, is being held in the county jail here as material witness, Sheriff J. W. Connell said Monday. He was allegedly in possession of stolen goods.

Two men were injured in a freak accident early Thursday morning at the First avenue and Cedar railroad crossing, according to a report filed by Raymond McCarthy, Forest Grove. McCarthy's written account of the accident said both he and a passenger, Wesley Peabody, were injured when he ran his truck into the side of a freight train stopped across the highway. The report said there was no warning by either signal or watchman.

A bicycle, belonging to Roy Burton, the two young sons, was stolen from the bike rack outside J. C. Penney's store Monday and later sold to the Fixit shop by a man giving his name as F. McDonald, according to a report in the sheriff's office. William Hosack, proprietor of the Fixit shop, gave sheriff's deputies a good description of the man.

Brought here by extradition from Tacoma, Wash., Alex Neetens, 68, will answer to a charge of cashing a spurious check with R. H. Butler in Banks last April. Neetens was brought to Hillsboro by Deputy Sheriff Dick Busch.

Work Started On Gas Station

Preliminary construction work on the new union oil company station at Second avenue and Washington street was being pushed ahead with all speed during the week preparatory to opening in 35 to 40 days.

The station will be of typical Union concrete and steel construction, equipped with three latest style pumps and three tanks with a total capacity of 2,550 gallons. Rest rooms will be built on the north boundary of the 77x186 lot and it is planned to set off a space in the rear for free parking accommodation to customers.

Contract for construction of the station has been let to the Reimers and Jolivet Construction company of Portland. Ground surface on the lot, which has been eased by the Union company, will be partly asphalt and partly concrete.

THE YOUNGER GENERATION (By Helen Rolf)

The food a child eats determines to a great extent his fitness for life. It regulates his growth and development and indirectly his disposition and character.

An undernourished child is usually irritable and unhappy and his body lacks the energy that is required for proper mental development.

The baby's requirements are usually satisfied with his milk, supplemented, as he grows older, by orange juice, egg yolk, cod liver oil and finally cereal and strained vegetables and fruit. These foods should be given to him on advice of his doctor.

As the child grows older his body makes greater demands and his diet planning becomes more complicated. He should be taught from infancy to eat a wide variety of wholesome foods. Good health habits should be encouraged as they stimulate his appetite. Great care should be taken that his diet includes all materials necessary for body-building, body regulation and body energy.

The U. S. government bulletin No. 1674 entitled, "Food for Children," lists the food for good nutrition, to be eaten each day, as follows:

Milk—At least a pint, preferably a quart.
Butter—At each meal.
Cereal, bread, or potatoes—At every meal.
Vegetables, other than potatoes—At least two daily, raw or quickly cooked; leafy kinds often.

Fruit—Once or twice a day. Citrus or other raw fruit or tomatoes daily.
Egg or Meat—The older child may have both on Saturday evening.

Sweets—In small amounts at end of meal.

Al Rosser Bail Reduction Hit

A motion by defense in the case of Al Rosser, ex-convict official indicted in Washington and Polk counties on labor terrorist charges, to reduce his bail in Polk county from \$16,000 to \$8,000 and to release him was being vigorously opposed early this week by Ralph A. Hybrid Development of Corn Promises Added Crop Yield To Washington County Farmers

Hybrid strains of field corn promise an increased yield of grain to Washington county farmers interested in growing corn for grain purposes. Not all hybrids are adapted to this locality. At a field meeting at the J. J. VanKlee farm Monday afternoon two Wisconsin hybrid strains looked especially good. They were well cared, well filled, and the maturity was satisfactory.

In the next few weeks corn from these plots will be picked and the yields computed. All of the hybrids in this trial are being grown in comparison with varieties commonly grown locally.

Hybrid Not for Seed

To most of the local farmers who want to grow seed corn, hybrid strains do not fit the program. The hybrid seed that is sold commercially produces a nice crop provided it is not used for seed, but the crop grown will not do for seed again as the next generation will begin to split up and revert back to the succeeding crop lacks uniformity and consequently both yield of grain and tonnage of forage. This fact means, then, that the average farmer who wants to grow hybrid corn should look at it as strictly a grain proposition, or an improved silage crop.

No Amateurs
Producing hybrid seed corn is not a job for an amateur. Eight to twelve years are ordinarily required to produce hybrid seed for market and the original crosses have to be made each year from pure strains to keep a new seed supply coming on. The development of the pure strains is a job in itself that requires five or six years.

While these hybrid strains show distinct promise, there is much to be done before they should replace our good local strains of the common varieties, according to R. E. Fore, of the farm crops department of the state college at Corvallis. Mr. Fore is carrying on some corn breeding work in an endeavor to obtain still better hybrid strains for Western Oregon.

Fore Addresses Farmers

At the meeting on the VanKlee farm, Mr. Fore told the farm group who were there that in Western Oregon when corn is planted on good land, and good seed of an adapted strain or variety is used, the average yield of corn here is about on a par with the average yield in the midwestern states. He pointed out the need of storage facilities and the advisability in a

Hybrid Development of Corn Promises Added Crop Yield To Washington County Farmers

Our growing season here is just as long as the growing season in the midwestern, but because of lower summer temperatures the corn does not grow as rapidly and consequently is a little slower to mature in the fall. This means that we must provide well-ventilated storage and, in some seasons, artificial drying is necessary.

Attention was called to Mr. VanKlee's corn crib which was built last year and from which he has just taken the last of his 1937 crop. This was filled with corn last October and he began grinding corn from the crib in January of this year. That is rather exceptional, but it illustrates what can be done with properly selected seed, good cultural practices, and proper storage.
