

Plans for Red Cross Roll And Seal Sale Clarified

Due to a misunderstanding in the minds of the people about the Red Cross Roll Call drive from Armistice Day, November 11, to Thanksgiving Day, and the Christmas Seal sale from Thanksgiving Day to Christmas, the American Red Cross and the National Tuberculosis association have made an agreement to prevent overlapping. Proceeds from the Red Cross Roll Call drive are used for help for the needy and emergency help in disasters, etc., while the proceeds of the Christmas Seal sale are used in a fight against tuberculosis and other health work. Both are worthy projects and should receive the support of all citizens.

The agreement follows:

1. That there is no official or other connection between the Roll Call and the Christmas Seal sale.
2. That the Roll Call is held from Armistice Day (Friday, November 11, 1938) up to and including Thanksgiving Day (Thursday, November 24, 1938); that the Seal sale begins the day after Thanksgiving.
3. That both the American Red Cross and the National Tuberculosis association will keep their chapters and affiliated associations constantly informed of this understanding and that both organizations will do what they can to clarify in all newspaper and other publicity the distinct character of the two fund-raising undertakings and to prevent overlapping of the periods during which it is agreed that the Roll Call and the Seal sale, respectively, shall be conducted.
4. That this agreement permits the National Tuberculosis association and its affiliated associations to deliver seals in advance to corporations and merchants who use them on their bills, which are mailed out a few days before the end of the month of November.
5. That this agreement refers specifically to the Roll Call and the Seal sale and does not preclude the extensive educational and publicity campaigns which the Red Cross and the National Tuberculosis association are accustomed to carry on throughout the year nor such pre-campaign publicity as may be necessary preceding the Roll Call or the Seal sale.
