CLEANLINESS DEMANDED

(By Oregon State Board of Health)

The proof that the public is becoming increasingly aware of the importance of cleanliness can be found in the sanitary regulations which have been adopted by health departments throughout this country. Foods must be guarded in transit from contamination and unnecessary human contact. These regulations have made it possible to purchase foods which are absolutely safe for human consumption without cooking. This is not true of many other countries where it is still necessary to cook all foods before they can be safely eaten.

The water supplies of modern cities are another example of what has been accomplished when the public demanded that public water supplies be made absolutely safe. Practically all of the larger cities of this country provide water that is without color and free from disease-producing organisms. The increased consumption of milk in this country has been due to the fact that it is now possible to secure a clean product that has been prepared properly, making it safe for consumption even by the nursing infant.

Cleanliness of our streets and homes is now assured by frequent removal of refuse matter. The water carriage system of sanitary sewage disposal has contributed to the pollution of our lakes and streams. At the present time the public is showing an increasing amount of interest in cleaning up our water ways. All over the country efforts are being made to develop satisfactory methods for sewage disposal. Stream cleanliness is nothing more than the regulation and control of stream pollution. The principal sources of pollution are domestic sewage and industrial wastes. Paper and woolen mills, canneries, milk products, packing houses, grain washers, flax retting and many other industrial plants dispose of waste products in convenient streams. These waste

products undergo decomposition and result in productions which are highly objectionable. Sewage is obnoxious to the senses because of the decomposing organic matter. All of the oxygen in the water is exhausted in this process making it impossible for fish and plant life to exist. In fact the river has been nothing more or less than an open sewer. Domestic sewage contains large numbers of pathogenic bacteria. The damage from bacteria comes from the fact that they live for considerable periods in water and that they do not cause more infection is little less than miraculous. The important point, however, is that polluted streams are unsightly, unclean and unfit for recreation and health purposes. A clean, healthy people naturally desire a clean streams and lakes. This is possible by the cooperation of the citizens of this state and the provision of means for the proper disposal of all waste and unclean refuse matter. What is needed at the present time is a sanitary reform that can be brought about at the least expense. Legislation is needed that will clothe the state authorities with power to prevent pollution of streams by sewage and industrial wastes. There should be an equitable adjustment of the cost of water purification and sewage treatment between the parties interested so that expenses can be spread over a period of years without making excessive demands on anyone.
