for the purpose of "devising ways and means for farmers to support themselves without relief from government."

Quoting United States import statistics, Mr. Grover declared a large part of the 2,500,000 tons of sugar imported annually from Cuba could be grown by American farmers. Mr. Grover also branded the present crop control program as a failure.

Other crop suggestions were grass seeds and flax, both of which are in market demand now. Irrigation, where possible, should be used to the utmost the county agent declared, and the farmer should always bear in mind that his income will be in direct ratio to the crop yielded per unit of land.

Hillsboro Grade Schools Invited To Junior Concerts
Portland Junior Symphony orchestra has invited the students of local grade schools to attend the Saturday morning Young People's concerts given at the public auditorium. They have given a special rate of 15 cents per program, or 30 cents for the three concerts rather than 50 cents.

Those children who attend the three programs are arranged particularly for students with interesting explanations of the music given before each number by Mr. David Campbell, master of ceremonies.

These children will have their names printed on the programs as junior music patrons. In order to have this done the 30 cents and the child's name must be brought to their home room teachers by Monday, November 14.

Bus transportation will be provided for those interested. Those who go on the bus must return on the bus unless definite arrangements are made between parents and teacher. The bus will leave the B. W. Barnes school promptly at 10:15 each time and return approximately at 1 o'clock to the same place.

The dates for the three concerts are November 18, February 18 and April 22. The hour 11 o'clock.
