Townsend Report On Tax Given

At the Townsend club pot luck dinner Monday evening in honor of President R. L. Townsend, the speaker. He made a report of Dr. Francis E. Townsend's recent visit to Hawaii where the "transaction" of "gross income tax" is working successfully for governing purposes. The founder of the Townsend Plan visited, according to his own word, the "tax commissioners of Honolulu" and visited and interviewed many big and little business men throughout the islands.

Reporting on his visit as reported in a recent issue of "Townsend National Weekly" the speaker quoted Dr. Townsend as follows:

"Here are the facts as they came to me through direct questioning of tax payers and through personal interviews with the tax officials and examination of their books."

"Everybody who engages in business in the islands is required to take out a license to do business. The charge is one dollar regardless of the size of business."

"The license is issued for a stipulated kind of business and is for the period of one year."

"A tax report form is issued with the license and the licensee is instructed by the tax office officials how to make out his reports. The dollar value of the full volume of business done is reported every 30 days and one and one-quarter per cent of such volume is sent in cash or by check with the official report form. This system makes the collection of the tax most effective and cheap, the entire expense of collection being only about one and one-half per cent of the entire volume reported."

"The system is looked upon as being just and fair to all and there is rarely an attempt at evasion recorded."

"The personnel in the tax commissioner's office is amazingly small. I did not see more than a dozen employees at any time and the report is that not many field men are required to visit the tax payers."

"One of the most valuable features of the system lies in the fact that a full report of the entire business of the islands is available every 30 days."

"As a result of the three years employment of the Gross Income tax the island government has paid off a million and a half dollars of government debt, has raised the pay of all government officials ten per cent, to the old standard and has accumulated a surplus of more than a million dollars on a tax rate of one and one-fourth per cent."

"The club voted to assist the local Red Cross membership drive by subscribing for a club membership. The next meeting of the club will be November 28. It will be the monthly social meeting."
