Driving Classes To Start Here

First of a series of seven safe-driving classes to be held at the Union high school here under the auspices of Secretary of State Earl Snell is scheduled for December 2 according to O. O. Freeman, who will assist E. L. VanBlaricom, state instructor. Following classes will be held on each Friday for the succeeding six weeks.

High school students interested in the course should register at the office of the city recorder. First class will be held jointly, the instructor from Secretary Snell's office said, but during the six following weeks high school students and adults will meet for instruction separately, students at 10:30 a. m. and adults at 9:30 a. m.

Practice Asked
Subsequent classes will be held at the same time each week. Instruction at each class will last about an hour, and those taking the course will be asked to practice for 15 minutes each day upon the maneuver studied at the preceding class.

"I want to emphasize that these classes actually teach driving," Snell said. "The students are asked to bring their own cars, and they learn by performing for themselves every step necessary in the operation of their cars. While the schools do not necessarily give the students the skill and experience required to pass a test for their drivers' licenses, everything is taught which they must know to pass the test, and in some cases they are ready for their licenses at the end of the seven weeks."

The schools, held concurrently in 10 communities during the seven-week period, are part of the secretary of state's campaign to reduce accidents and deaths on Oregon's highways.

limitation and made a special tax levy the same, as is that for support of the elementary schools. Inclusion of this levy in the county budgets, it was said, is seriously crippling other county activities, particularly the road program.

Treasurers Lauded
County treasurers were lauded in an address by Governor-elect C. A. Sprague for their splendid handling of financial problems during the depression years and were complimented for their campaign to reduce the state's debt.

Most important resolution adopted by the treasurers was in opposition to retroactive features of the proposed federal law taxing securities of state, counties and municipalities and public officers. Present officers of the association were re-elected and Portland chosen for their 1939 convention. Homer C. Parrett, McMinnville, is president of the organization.

Clerks, Recorders
Clerks and recorders adopted a resolution urging the United States attorney-general to challenge the constitutionality of the law providing fees for declaration and records of immigrant candidates for United States citizenship. The clerks also chose Portland for their next year's meeting. Carl Pershing, Lakeview, was elected president of the clerks and recorders' association. Carl Gildersleeve, Toledo, was elected vice-president, and Carl Graves, Dallas, secretary and treasurer.

Hillsboro's volunteer fire department was larger by three members Thursday night with the initiation of candidates after a period of probation. The new firemen are Vernon Young, Glen Shattuck and Andrew Young. A. L. Brock, old member of the department, said Friday the men will be subject to call on all fires hereafter.

McGee Defends Tax Movement

revenues to maintain city streets which in many instances are going to ruin through inability of cities to increase general taxes for their repair.

"The principle that a part of the highway revenues should be shared by other governmental units which maintain streets and roads has been recognized in Oregon for many years, since counties have been sharing in highway revenues almost since the beginning," he said. "An extension of this policy to include city streets is absolutely necessary if there is to be an adequate maintenance system."

Survey Cited
A recent survey by the highway department and the U. S. bureau of public roads recommended cities spend immediately \$1,914,263 to put the city streets in adequate riding condition. Such expenditure by the cities would be impossible under present tax structures, McGee said.

The highway commission report said \$745,000 of the motor vehicle revenues should have been apportioned to cities in 1936 for street maintenance. Instead cities have never received anything, but are asking \$600,000 for 1939.
