Safety Hints

A fact which puzzles many drivers is that they are apparently blinded for a few seconds immediately after passing an approaching car at night. What some drivers do not realize is that this blindness is not merely apparent—it is very real.

Part of the difficulty lies in the period required for the pupils of the eye to enlarge after being forced to contract by the brilliant headlights. Only when enlarged to the fullest extent are the pupils efficient in detecting subtle differences of shade in dark objects.

But this adjustment in normal persons is comparatively rapid. A second and more important adjustment is required in the chemical substance forming the light-sensitive cells in the retina which mirrors what the eye perceives. These cells, composed of a substance called "visual purple," are rapidly depleted when exposed to strong light and the speed with which they build up again varies according to the individual's stored-up supply of the necessary ingredients.

Experiments have demonstrated that the chief element in visual purple is vitamin A, and that persons possessing plenty of this vitamin readjust themselves quickly after exposure to light, while others may require several seconds.

Therefore, drivers who experience more than an instant's "blindness" after passing another car should allow for this slower reaction, and cut their speed as much as necessary until their dark-perceptiveness is restored.
