Walnut "Bleeding" Not Serious

Bleeding of walnut trees, which may occur any time after a wound has been made until the foliage comes out, receives little attention from commercial growers, but is often a source of worry to those who own only a few trees.

C. E. Schuster, federal nut specialist at Oregon State college, bleeding seems to occur following a drop in temperature after the wound has been made, and Schuster suggests that the best way to prevent it is to delay pruning until just before the leaves come out. The bleeding itself is not dangerous but after it has stopped it is best to treat the wounds with some disinfectant like a bordeaux paste.

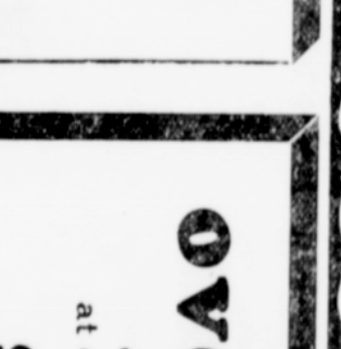

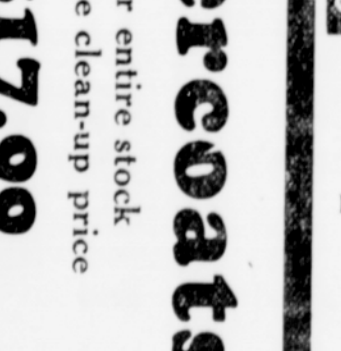

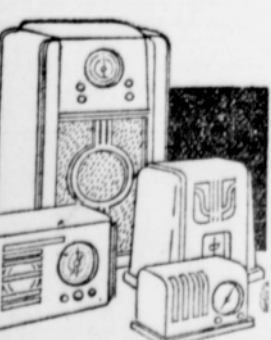
