Senator Ross Predicts Many Vital Questions Before Solons

ALOHA—Senator Lyman Ross departs Saturday for Salem to be in readiness for the opening of the 40th general assembly of the legislature on January 9. The number of proposed bills that have been suggested for consideration by this assembly is greater than any number presented before any recent session," said Senator Ross.

"I have received a large volume of matters of vital interest to Washington county. As usual some bitter controversy will undoubtedly arise over the subject of milk control and motor transportation. The request of the League of Cities for part of the highway revenues to be used for maintenance and construction of city streets gives every indication of becoming one of the most controversial measures ever to be presented," said Senator Ross.

"The question of state finances, will as in other sessions, be a vital issue. So will the proposed relief and social security legislation. In spite of the good intentions of the leaders of the coming session to wind up the business in 26 full days, it is my belief that the session will extend considerably beyond this limit."
