Current Fiction Favorites Now Available Here

Many of the latest and most popular books acquired by the Hillsboro library in recent weeks are now on the shelves for public pleasure, according to Mrs. Georgia Smith, librarian.

Among current best sellers on the shelves is De La Roche's "Growth of a Man." In characteristically De La Roche style, the book is a character study having as its subject a Canadian boy's struggle to succeed as a lumberman.

Conflict is injected into the plot when illness from overwork forces the ambitious youth to fight for his life, delaying his intended marriage and his plans to help a dependent mother. Meeting all his obstacles heroically, the boy enters manhood mentally and emotionally matured, the book as a whole, with its true-to-life pictures of Canadian farm and family life and its well portrayed minor characters will be enjoyed by fiction readers. It is a worthwhile addition to De La Roche's growing contribution to the world of literature.

Another of the late popular books is Elizabeth Corbett's new novel, "She was Carrie Eaton." It is the story of a young miss before she was married, portraying the sheltered existence of women during the late nineteenth century. Those who enjoyed "Nice Long Evening" and "House Across the River" will be fascinated by this latest of Miss Corbett's novels.

Also lately acquired is "Wisdom's Gate" by Margaret Ayer Barnes, another current favorite. The story is a good account of modern families and their adjustments to complications of divorce, carrying the family of "Years of Grace" into the next generation. Still other worthwhile books now available are Mary Roberts Rinehart's "Married People" and "Serpent in the Garden," written by Ethel M. Dell, author of "Storm Drift," "Way of an Eagle" and others.
