

About \$2200 Collected On Red Cross Roll Call

Approximately \$2200 was gathered in during the Red Cross roll call in the county, according to the final report given at the county chapter meeting last Thursday night at the chamber of commerce rooms. The exact sum was \$2198.41, with several communities not reporting.

Hillsboro led with \$787 in cash contributions, including 48 contributing memberships of \$5, 14 sustaining memberships of \$10, and two \$25 supporting memberships, a total of \$430. Of these larger memberships, only 30 cents from each is sent to the national, \$22 leaving \$398 here. Besides the larger memberships, 356 of \$1 were given with two donations of 50 cents each, and also 12 cases of Carnation milk, valued at \$39, making a total of \$526.

Chairman Norman also reported that 127 school rooms had joined the Junior Red Cross. Memberships are 50 cents per room and the 127 rooms represented 2700 pupils.

Red Cross Life Saving classes are being organized by Stewart Norton of Hillsboro, and anyone interested may see him at the Five-Spot sandwich shop on East Main street. Classes will be held at the Pacific University natatorium.

Two resignations from the county chapter were accepted with regret, that of Mrs. E. L. Moore as secretary and M. P. Cady as director, because of lack of time to attend to their duties. Mrs. Louise Hurd was appointed to fill the office of secretary, and the vacancy on the board will be filled later.
