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Bethany Dairy Herd Record Is Outstanding

The herd of registered Holsteins owned by John A. Lawyers Hold Fees 'Too High'

The state bar association scale of minimum service charges proposed for Oregon attorneys is too high and would be "discrediting to the profession," it was voted in a motion of Washington county attorneys at the annual business meeting of the county bar association held here Wednesday night. The attorneys resolved to continue, abiding by a lower scale now being used in this section.

Particularly pointed out as exorbitant were proposed fees for such minor services as deeds, mortgages, wills, oral advice and bankruptcy proceedings. The minimum fees schedule had been adopted by the Oregon State Bar association last September.
