

Leather Belts Are Stolen from Westimber Mill

Last of a long series of thefts at the Westimber Lumber Company at Westimber was called to the attention of the sheriff's office here Wednesday. A recent check of equipment at the mill shows that five leather belts, the largest of which was 80 feet long and 10 inches wide, the report said. Other equipment has been lost in previous raids, it was added.

Income Tax Counsel Offered

Grand Jury Returns True Bills for Five

Five men were indicted in true bills returned by Washington county's grand jury which adjourned Saturday after being in session three days. John L. Doane, 44, Beaverton, was named on a drunken driving charge. Doane, now out on bail, retained K. C. Tanner, Portland labor case attorney, as counsel.

Following indictment by the secret body on a charge of larceny by bailee, Henry Vanvae, Rippling Wells, pleaded guilty in Circuit Judge R. Frank Peters' court and received a suspended sentence. He allegedly borrowed and sold a set of harness.

Others named in true bills were Lloyd Beard, 27, Banks, who allegedly threatened the life of a woman; Charles Bafford and James Whitney, Portland, for attempted larceny in a Hillsboro clothing store.

Pleading guilty to a charge of short-change operations, Don Melin, 24, and Edgar Sward, 33, Portland, were each sentenced to six months in the county jail with paroles ordered after 30 days.

February 17 was set as date for sentencing five other men who entered guilty pleas in circuit court Saturday. They are Clarence Isaacson, 22, William Ooster, 26, and Silas Goff, Seaside, charged with theft of some donkey engine parts from a sawmill, and Eugene Dressel, 18, and Levi Andrew Dressel, 19, charged with car rifling at a Sherwood dance hall.
