

Alleged Labor Goon Moved From Jail Here

James M. Scott, Portland union official, who was being held in jail here following his plea of not guilty to an indictment for participation in a Tigard beer tavern bombing, was this week delivered into the custody of authorities at Skamania county, Wash., where he is charged with labor vandalism.

Transfer of Scott was marked by District Attorney G. Russell Morgan, as probably the last chapter in Washington county's so-called goon prosecutions.

The district attorney's office here was busy this week perfecting the prosecution's brief in the supreme court appeal of Jack Estabrook.

former Portland labor official, who is now at liberty pending re-trial of his case before the high tribunal. Estabrook was found guilty in circuit court here of participation in the Memorial Day, 1935, bombing of a Rock Creek store and was sentenced to 18 months in the state penitentiary, but has not started serving that sentence as was erroneously stated in this column last week.

Gray Back in Jail
Arthur Gray, Forest Grove, was back in jail Monday for the third time within a month after being arrested by Deputy Sheriff Dick Busch for violation of the terms of his parole. He was sentenced on a drunkenness charge more than two weeks ago and granted the privilege of serving his sentence on week-ends. The arrest Monday is the second on the same charge since being sentenced.

Appearing in Judge R. Frank Peters' circuit court Thursday, George Wright, 40, Timber, was sentenced to serve 90 days in the county jail. He was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Dick Busch last week on a drunken driving charge.

A circuit court decision was handed down Monday by Judge R. Frank Peters sustaining a Beaver-ton justice court in awarding \$95.50 damages to John Holden in a car accident suit brought against Priscilla Gabel, driver of the other car. Judge Peters found that the defendant was responsible for damages to Holden's truck in not yielding right of way to him. The Beaver-ton decision had been appealed.
