Union Services for Good Friday Are Planned Here

The seventh and eighth grades of the B. W. Barnes school will place a few of their shop projects on display in Weil's Department store, where they can be viewed Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

In regard to this work we feel that vocational education has received such an over-emphasis in recent years that the primary aim of manual arts has become obscure," declared Walter L. Henry, instructor.

"Instructors as well as parents have become somewhat confused as to what they expect a pupil to accomplish in a school shop.

"Every experience a pupil receives in school should contribute to his general rather than his specific education and contributes indirectly to his future life career."

"As we do not, in other grade school subjects, select and definitely train pupils to become doctors, lawyers, engineers, etc., neither should we expect to start them definitely on the road to become carpenters, cabinet makers, electricians, metal workers, etc., in the school shops.

"We should, then, choose subject matter based upon child interests and future general, rather than specific needs.

"In an effort to provide variety in this work and to contribute to general knowledge, we introduced the leather work last year and the pupils have shown a great deal of interest and enthusiasm in it."

Tuesday, April 11, F. C. degrees will be conferred by the lodge; and Friday, April 14, the M. M. degrees will be given candidates.



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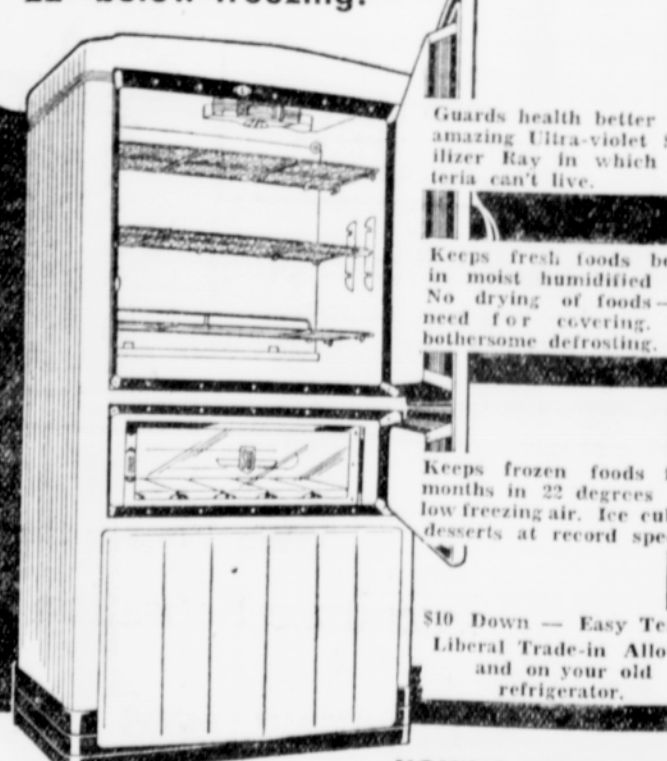
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
