acted with petitions by Anderson, which were approved by City Manager J. W. Barney to improve Lincoln street between Seventh avenue and Cornell road and Ninth avenue between Main and Lincoln.

The council adopted a resolution to proceed with the requested improvements. Date for hearing of recommendations on the improvements was set for May 2.

To Dedicate Eighth. The council passed a resolution instructing City Manager Barney to proceed with dedication of Eighth avenue between Oak and Walnut and between Main and Lincoln streets. Barney's recommendation for a call for bids on galvanizing metal roofing for the new city warehouse was approved and May 2 was set as final date for accepting the bids.

W. W. Crawford, gasoline distributing agent, was granted permission to construct an above-ground petroleum storage tank and unit buildings on a site within the industrial area to be approved later by the city planning committee and the council.

Water Purity Discussed. Aftermath of a discussion held some time ago as to the purity of Hillsboro's water, Manager Barney read a letter from the state board of health declaring that no water samples from Hillsboro have been submitted for the past 15 months and informing the city that state law requires specimens of the city water shall be submitted for testing at monthly intervals. The council passed a motion to notify the water company here of the state requirement.

A park improvement budget report signed by J. L. Anderson, chairman, and E. J. McAlister, estimating 1939 income of the park at \$2,500 and budgeting expenditures of the same amount was read and approved.

Street Improvement Due. On recommendation of the street committee, three resolutions of intention to improve were instituted by the city. The first would put a macadam surface and curbing on a two-block section of North Second avenue from Jackson to Jefferson streets. Fourth avenue between Oak and Cedar and Cedar macadamized by the second improvement project, which would

Police Report Heard. In the early part of the meeting, Chief of Police W. W. Weaver presented his first quarter report of police activities and finances. Twenty arrests were made and a total of 108 traffic tags written during that period. Chief Weaver said. Of the arrests, one was for larceny of gasoline, one for reckless driving, four for drunkenness, two for drunken driving, three for drunk and disorderly, three for disorderly conduct, three for juveniles on larceny charges and three for juveniles out after hours. It was reported.

A total of \$312 was taken in by the police department during the first quarter, the chief said, with recorder's court fines after arrests representing \$274 of that amount and traffic tag fines \$27. Total expenses, including \$102.46 for the police car, during the period were \$153.16, leaving a profit balance of \$159.84, he said.
