Brief Strike Pupils Held At Sherwood

MOUNTAIN HOME—About 20 per cent of the pupils of Sherwood high school carried out their threatened strike last Thursday morning, as a gesture of protest because Raymond Carl was not given a contract to teach in the school again next year. Those striking were mainly pupils who take band instruction under Carl. The strike was orderly, but some radical signs were displayed. These sought to cast aspersions against the principal, J. H. Tumbleson. Because of the small percentage of pupils striking, those taking part gave up picketing after one half day remaining outside the school house.

A deputy sheriff remained near the school house during the duration of the strike. Members of the school board were present, but few went on as usual in the school. Six-week test were being held, and those who were on strike missed out on those.

The doors of the school house were locked, with one exception according to report of pupils, and Tumbleson remained at the unlocked door to discourage any more pupils joining the strikers.

Earlier in the week the board members held an open meeting to which patrons of the school were invited to attend. A large number of those living in and near Sherwood attended, and full opportunity was given for all to express their ideas in regard to the question of re-hiring Raymond Carl as shop and manual training instructor, and band leader. The board members said they had no plan to re-hire Carl, but that he had purchased equipment without proper authority was entirely unfounded, and that he himself furnished band instruments for those who could not buy their own. He has never charged any equipment to the board nor to the student body, and his books are in perfect order, the board members said. The fact that he was not offered the same position next year was based on other reasons. It is thought that there was too much work involved for one person to try to teach so many classes. It is hoped, so say some of the members of the board, that means whereby Carl can be retained as music and band instructor may be worked out.

No definite action by the board has as yet been reported.
