Students Warned of Danger in Unpreparedness

Storm Troopers of America Need Loyalty, Not Uniforms, Paul Patterson Says in Talk

"You are the storm troopers of America," Paul Patterson, Legionnaire, told the union high school student body in an Army Day address here Thursday. "You don't have to wear uniforms; all you need to be loyal Americans and proud of the country you live in."

In such an analogy did Speaker Patterson present to the high school students here the place of youth in this country as compared with corresponding age groups in unnamed European states where the bulk of so-called storm troops are recruited between fourteen and twenty years of age.

Seriousness Urged
Recalling humorous army stories he had told to a similar student gathering on last Army Day, the speaker said, "I fear those jokes will have to last another year, for the vein in which my mind is working today is not exactly a joking matter."

He then portrayed in words a few of the great war's tragedies, "not found in history books," which were the result of pitiful lack of preparedness for war. Youngsters some of whom were fighting in front line trenches six weeks after their day of enlistment. Many instances are on army records of such strained youths inadvertently killed in their own battles in battle he said, because they were so un-nerved by the suddenness of war.

Just prior to the entry of this country in the world war, "Germany did not believe that America could or would put an army in the world." The fact that we did put an army in the field proved how far Germany had miscalculated this country's ability to organize and dispatch troops.

But America was unprepared, he said, and is not adequately prepared today. Peace movements must not miss their mark by opposing preparedness, he declared, because preparedness is the only safeguard for peace.

Peace Need Felt in 1918

"If you believe the peace movement today is strong, you would have difficulty conceiving the American people's determination at the conclusion of the last war not to include in another armed conflict."

"We actually believed at that time that there would be no more wars, that we had just fought and won 'a war to end all wars,'" he said. But succeeding years have proved that supposition false, he continued, and now there is an even greater need for preparedness.

Argument Attacked

One of the chief arguments against preparedness, he said, is the huge cost of war machines and materials. Some pacifists point out how many school buildings could be constructed with money now being used for war preparedness, but what good would beautiful school buildings be to us, it was asked, if we were to be suddenly invaded and find ourselves deprived of administering them?

Edgaris Speaks

A similar program was observed later in the afternoon at the junior high school, where Francis Sturgis, local attorney and Lions club member, addressed students and townspeople on Americanism and the place our army plays in preserving peace. Mayor Rogers also delivered a short talk on patriotism. Two songs were rendered by a junior high school choral group of 40 voices and on a number of 40 in a mass ring of Irving Berlin's "God Bless America."

Two cannons of the National Guard unit here were placed on display in front of the high school and later rolled into Aloha and Beaverton with a number of the guardmen as military escort. Merchants and Main street shoppers were afforded a view of the guns earlier in the day at a short exhibition while wheeled artillery was parked in front of the chamber of commerce hall.

County Plan Groups Lauded By Shepherd

The work of county planning committees in helping shape a valuable program for the agricultural adjustment administration in Oregon was praised recently by John Shepherd of Linn county, member of the state AAA committee, in a talk over radio station KOAC at Corvallis.

Shepherd, a well known diversified farmer and prominent in farm organization work, spoke on "Good Land Use Through the Farm Program" in his radio appearance the night of April 7.

"You are familiar with the agricultural planning conferences which have been held in Oregon counties the last several years," he said.

Needs Considered

Farmers such as you and I sat around the conference table and discussed good farming methods, and talked about what our counties needed in order to bring a better rural income. Our major recommendations have been incorporated into the AAA farm program. In other words, when we co-operate with the farm program, we're doing those things which our own planning committees have recommended."

Among conservation practices being carried on in the Willamette valley under the farm program, with "county planning committees as supporters," he listed reseeded of pasture, range, logged-off and burn-land, greater use of green manure crops on orchard and berry lands, more use of lime, phosphate, gypsum and sulphur, increased planting of alfalfa and red clover, and control of noxious weeds.

The committee said that 45,000 Oregon farmers are co-operating in conservation features of the farm program, 20,000 of them living in the Willamette valley.
