

Holdup Pair Get Five-Year Prison Terms

Donald Charles Gaslin and Roland C. Kimmey, arrested last month for holding up a Beaverton service station, were sentenced by Circuit Judge R. Frank Peters, Friday, to serve indeterminate sentences of five years each in the state penitentiary. The pair had pleaded guilty and waived time for sentencing.

Arrested by State Officer James Burns as they came out of a beer tavern near Newberg, the men were identified as a pair wanted on another holdup charge in Harlem, Montana, officers said. Police also charged them with theft of the automobile which they were driving.

The holdup pair were named in one of two true bills returned by the grand jury Friday. The other indictment named Lyle Malcolm, 32, on a morals charge. Malcolm was given until Tuesday to secure an attorney and enter a plea.

Circuit Judge R. Frank Peters ordered Thursday that a bench warrant be issued for the defendant in the case of Cassie Mitchell vs. Frank B. Mitchell to appear April 14 for contempt of court. He has been charged with failure to pay alimony as directed by the court.

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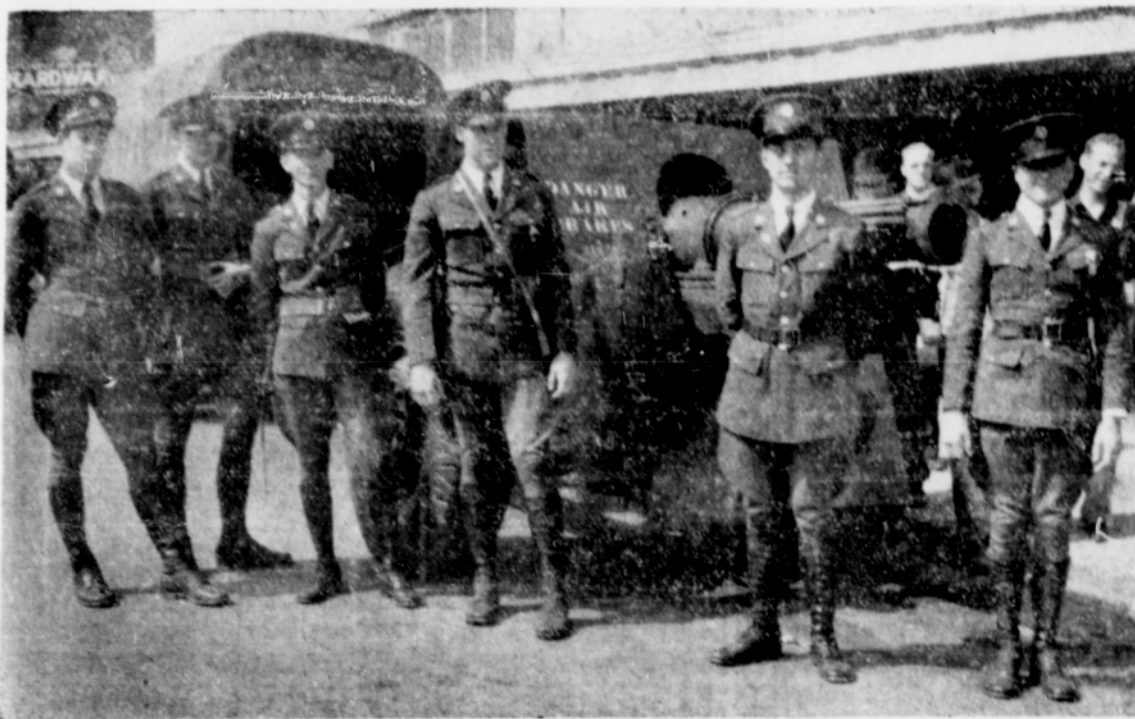
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Field Cannons Exhibited on Army Day

Homemakers Aid By Sending Tried, Favorite Recipes

Devised Hamburger

Three tablespoons salad oil or rendered suet, 1½ pounds hamburger, 1 pound ground lean pork, 1 large onion, diced, 1 large green pepper, diced, 1 small bunch celery, diced, 1 can condensed tomato soup, 1 tablespoon prepared mustard, 1 cup water. About 15 slices cheese, red pepper. About 15 slices cheese. Melt fat in deep skillet, add meat and brown lightly, stirring and breaking into small pieces. Add onion, green pepper and celery, stir until mixed. Add rest of ingredients except cheese. Mix and cover tightly and simmer 30 minutes or longer. The mixture should be piping hot and thick as stiff oatmeal mush. To serve put heaping spoonful between split bun with thin slice of cheese on top of mixture. Gladys Aten.

Good Nut Candy

Melt 1 cup sugar, stirring constantly; add 1 cup sweet milk drop by drop, then add 2 more cups sugar. Stir little to keep from stick-

ing. Cook until it forms a soft ball and remove from stove. Add 1 tablespoon butter and pinch of salt. Beat until it begins to thicken, add 1 cup chopped walnuts and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Pour in buttered pan, when cool cut in squares.—Mrs. Ernest Creekpaun, Cornelius.
