

Bonneville Buys Land in County For Power Line

Possession of land in Washington county for the 110,000 volt Bonneville power line through Portland, Salem and other Willamette valley communities to Eugene was granted by Federal District Judge James Alger Fee at Portland.

The court's action came as part of condemnation proceedings instituted in behalf of the project by John C. Fischer, Bonneville general counsel, through the office of United States District Attorney Carl C. Donagh.

Line Enters County
The big power line will enter Washington county at the junction of Skyline boulevard and the Gresham road and follow a course west of Beaverton and Tigard. It will leave the county near the southeastern corner to cross the Willamette river at Wilsonville.

Seventy-two ownerships are involved in the Washington county land. A check for \$40,000 has been deposited with the court by Bonneville as payment for the property. The court will disburse the amount to individual owners upon proper proof of title and value.

Possession June 1
Judge Fee authorized Bonneville to take immediate possession of the unoccupied land in the strip and set June 1 as the date for possession of occupied land.

Construction of the line to Eugene already is under way in Lane county as part of Bonneville's program to have power in Eugene by fall. The cities of Eugene, Corvallis and Monmouth have taken the lead among Willamette valley communities seeking power from the line and renewed action for the creation of utility districts has been reported by groups in Marion, Benton, Linn, Lane, and Washington counties.

Asparagus Pack Employs 200 Here

Crews aggregating more than 200 workers are now engaged in quick-freeze operations at the B. E. Maling plant. It was announced this week by Jack Reector, superintendent. After unexpected delays, the arrival of asparagus crops from the Kennewick, Wash., district, the cannery here opened last Tuesday.

No additional workers will be hired at the plant until sometime during the second week of May when the first canning spinners cropstart coming in. Reector stated that at that time, he said, between 200 and 300 men and women will be added to the present force.

Grade Schools To Get \$27,000

Checks totaling \$27,213.41 will be mailed to Washington county's 116 elementary schools May 1 as the first half payment on their 1939 apportionment, according to Zola Morgan, assistant to O. B. Kraus, county school superintendent. The checks will also represent payment in full of the 1938-39 elementary fund.

Apportionment is made on a teacher basis at a rate of \$130.23 per teacher. The balance of \$34,431.92 due in 1939 will be divided on November 1.

Hillsboro will get the largest portion of the current payment, \$2604.80 and Forest Grove, next largest, \$1831.45. Beaverton's share will be \$1172.07, Tigard, \$1041.84; Aloha, \$731.38; Tualatin, \$631.15; Cornelius, Banks, Reedville, and Metzger, \$330.92 each, and Sherwood, \$390.69. The remainder, representing the great bulk of the fund, will go to the one and two-teacher schools.
