Benjamin Monroe Patterson, brother of Mrs. Guy E. Gibbons and Douglas Patterson of Hillsboro, died Saturday at his home in Baker after a lengthy illness. Funeral services were held Tuesday. He was born in Springfield, Mo., May 26, 1874. He was engaged in mining at Salida, Col., and in 1900 moved to Cornucopia, where he mined until 1920, when he became deputy sheriff of the county, serving until 12 years ago.

Surviving him are his widow, one daughter, Mrs. Ray Hindman of Baker; the brother and sister above named and another sister Mrs. F. D. Applin of San Francisco, Cal. He had many friends in Hillsboro, where he had often visited.

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Davis to Serve Two-Year Term In Penitentiary

Vernon C. Davis, 18, of Hillsboro, was sentenced Friday by Circuit Judge R. Frank Peters to serve two years in the state penitentiary on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. Sentence on Clayton H. Elford, 20, of Hillsboro, who was arrested with Davis, was postponed until November 4 with provision that he shall remain in jail until that time.

Both youths waived grand jury indictment and pleaded guilty before Judge Peters to cashing worthless checks. With two others, a minor boy and girl, the pair was arrested in Chehalis, Wash., while in possession of an allegedly stolen car. One of the minors was sent to the state industrial school and the other paroled.

Argument in the supreme court appeal of Jack Estabrook, who was sentenced to 18 months in prison in a circuit court trial here, has been set for May 17, it was announced Wednesday from the office of District Attorney G. Russell Morgan.

John L. Doane, convicted by a circuit court jury on April 19 of drunken driving, was sentenced Friday by Judge R. Frank Peters to serve 60 days in the county jail and to pay \$150 fine and court costs. The jail sentence to be suspended on payment of the fine and costs. A ten-day stay of execution was granted by the court.

Lost Your Keys, Wallet, "Specs"? Try the Argus Lost and Found

If Margie Imlay will call at the Argus office and identify herself she may have a football pin with her name and the year '37 engraved on the back. Likewise, if William King of Cornelius will drop by and make proper identification, he may have a billfold with his name on a card therein.

These are only starters in a lengthy list of items included in the Hillsboro Argus lost and found department. If you've lost your keys, gloves or spectacles, your pouch or wallet, napkins, cups or dishes, love letters, photos or personal papers, the end of your search may be in the conglomeration which has collected at this office over the years.

"Misery Division"
In the "misery division," or lost keys department, there are 31 cases or rings of keys and in addition, 35 loose keys. The grand total, taking each lock-piece separately, is 161. If you've been locked out of your house or car for months because the "S-S-S-S-S" keys got lost, there is a chance the missing ring or case may be in this "misery collection."

If Lester Stringer still wants his 1935 Red Cross membership card, we've got it. If Elizabeth Davis, Grant high school student at Portland will call, the lost and found department will gladly give up a quantity of personal cards and papers bearing her name.

Wallets and Purse
Joseph A. (illegible) of route 1, Box 128, Banks, may have a wallet apparently belonging to him if he will appear and make proper identification of same. Wallets, purses and pouches, both ladies' and men's, of every size and description, are in the Argus "wealth" collection. One purse contains two cents, another 13 cents (unlucky number), another a crumpled dollar bill. All will be returned to their proper owners on identification.
