"In order to accomplish and establish real Americanism again in our country we should have a selective registration of all the inhabitants thereof. Those who are found classified as communists, Nazis and fascists, whether alien or native born, should be sent to the countries that have adopted the same that they believe in."

"Plant in the minds of our people, let it take root and flourish the idea that America is the best country in the world to live in, that it was established by the toil, effort and sacrifice of our forefathers, that it is a precious heritage that once lost may never again be attained, that an American may be either a Catholic, Jew or Protestant and worship according to the tenets of his faith but he cannot go to heaven unless he is a good American, and our country will be safe."

Several of the United States Spanish War Veterans presided. Invocation and benediction were given by Rev. Henry Halter and "Taps" were blown by Nelson Weaver and Robert Brisset of the Sea Scouts.

Keeney Explains Co-op Hospitals
Interest of the Washington County Farmers' Union in a co-operative state hospital was heightened this week following a public meeting of the group in the union high school auditorium Saturday night.

Four Filipinos Jailed After Stabbing Fray

Four Filipinos were in jail and two white persons were being held as material witnesses this week as the result of a near-riot brawl at the Balm Grove dance hall Saturday night during which six persons received knife wounds or other injuries.

Booked on charges of assault with a dangerous weapon are Marciano P. Carino, 29; Mike P. Cortez, 30; Morris P. Ragano, 28; and Rudy Q. Flores, 29, all of whom gave the same Portland address. Being held as material witnesses are Mrs. Goldie Piercy, 24, and John May 19, both of Portland, who allegedly accompanied the Filipinos to the dance hall.

No formal charges had been filed against the men by District Attorney G. Russell Morgan by Wednesday morning and the men under arrest were persistent in their denial of any participation in the slashing affray. They were arrested by Deputy Sheriff Ben Cornelius and State Officer Walter Hadfield some time after the brawl had broken up.

Two Severely Injured
Two men were severely injured in the fight and are now recuperating at the Forest Grove general hospital. They are Dick McKinney, 22, Newberg, who reportedly received cuts on his face, under his heart and near the right kidney, and Darrell Steyffler, 18, Newberg, who suffered a deep cut on the left hip.

Others injured in the brawl were Ed Keller, 26, and his brother, Otto Keller, 22, both of Gales Creek, who allegedly sustained knife wounds; Richard Heisler, 18, Gales Creek, who allegedly cut his foot on broken glass from a car window; and Harvey Wilson, 30, Gales Creek, who allegedly sustained a minor body injury.

The stabbing affray was the second which has occurred at the dance hall in the last month. Bernard Taylor, 26, was sentenced to a seven-year prison term last week after admittedly stabbing two persons there the preceding week.

Investigations being conducted by deputy sheriffs had failed to uncover all details of the riot. According to one of the material witnesses the four Filipinos had set out in a car with two white couples for a residence in the vicinity of Gales Creek and had stopped at the dance hall to locate a party.

Leaving the Filipinos in the car, the two white couples went into the dance hall and on coming out found one of the Filipinos in an altercation with one of the men later injured. In attempting to separate the two, another white man was thrown into the fight and others pitched in on both sides.

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
