Growth Predicted

WALLA METTE VALLEY, Ore.—The first mass was finished and we stood in a group discussing the recently laid foundations of the church in Oregon.

Being a new gathering for the Walla Mette Valley, I was much interested in the future of the church. I voiced this interest to Dr. John McLaughlin, a man of wide influence and knowledge, to express his opinion concerning this subject.

After a long monologue he responded, "Today was the beginning in Oregon of a great institution—the church. What will it be in ten, fifty, or even a hundred years? I venture to say that by the turn of the century our twenty-six Catholic families will have increased to 34,000."

I gasped, "Do you really mean to say that we will grow to that extent?"

"Certainly," he thundered. "Why, we'll number ninety churches, fifty schools, and all of two hundred priests by then."

Here he bent forward in his chair and continued, "I'll wager that by 1939 we'll have a Catholic population of 70,000."

He continued more calmly, "People must have religion to live. The church is a big thing, a living thing. This country is big. It will take a big religion to serve it."

Glancing at the clock, I saw that I had but an hour before the deadline. As my genial host had settled into a pensive silence, I bade him goodbye and set forth for the office.
