

## Petty Thefts Flood Sheriff's Office Here

Many pages were added to the sheriff's report file in County Sheriff J. W. Connell's office this week as a flood of petty thefts seemed to pervade another crime wave in the county. The local postoffice and two Hillsboro business establishments were prowled with small losses reported by the last two. (See burglary story on page one.)

### Truck Wheels Stolen

R. W. Williams, 610 East Walnut, advised the sheriff's office that a tire, tube and wheel was stolen from his truck sometime Saturday night, while the vehicle was parked behind his residence. A tire, tube and wheel was also reported stolen from a truck owned by C. D. Chamberlain of North Plains on the same night. A 12x15 tarpaulin thrown over the truck was also listed as missing.

An Orenco resident reported that a man giving his name as Alton Hurst, raised his sixteen-year-old daughter to accompany him to The Dalles, where they are believed to be picking cherries. Hurst's home is listed on police records as Climax Springs, Mo., and it is thought possible that the pair may be headed for that part of the country.

## Homemakers Aid By Sending Tried, Favorite Recipes

### Bran Muffins

One cup bran, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1 cup white flour, pinch salt, 2 eggs, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1 tablespoon melted butter. Measure bran, sifted flour, baking powder, salt, add egg yolks beaten until light, and melted butter. Beat until smooth and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake on hot iron—100 May Bellinger, Hillsboro.

### Baked Potatoes with Ham

Place a layer of sliced raw potatoes in the bottom of a baking dish; then a layer of sliced ham, sprinkle with a few bread crumbs. Repeat with potatoes and ham until dish is full. Put layer of potatoes on top and dot with butter, salt and pepper. Pour enough milk over top to cover. Bake in slow oven 2 to 2 1/2 hours—Ida May Bellinger, Hillsboro.

### Lemon Sponge Pie

One cup sugar, 3 tablespoons flour, 1/2 cup melted butter, yolks of 2 eggs, grated rind of 1 lemon. Beat all together until creamy, then add cup of milk, juice of lemon, and lastly the beaten whites of eggs. Bake in slow oven 30 minutes—Ida May Bellinger, Hillsboro.

### Nut Short Bread

Quarter pound butter, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 teaspoon water, 1 cup flour, 1/2 cup nuts.

Cream butter and sugar. Then add rest of ingredients. Make a roll 1 1/2 inches long. Bake in ungreased pan in slow oven. While warm, roll in sugar—Corinne Pennington, Hillsboro.

### Date Dainty

One cup sugar, 1 tablespoon butter melted, 2 tablespoons hot water, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1 cup chopped nuts, 2 eggs, pinch salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup flour, 1 cup chopped dates.

Put into a flat pan and bake for 1/2 hour. Then cut in sticks and roll in sugar—Corinne Pennington, Hillsboro.

### Stuffed Lamb Chops with Mushroom Sauce

Have the chops cut about 1 1/2 inches thick. Salt each chop, cutting to the bone. Make a stuffing by soaking 1 cup of stale bread crumbs until soft, drain, and squeeze dry. Mince an onion, add salt and pepper to taste. Then mix with bread crumbs, add 1/2 teaspoon sage, 1 teaspoon or more of melted butter and a beaten egg. Fill the opening in each chop and close the edges with strips of bacon tied together.

## Hillsboro 4-H Team Wins Trip To National Poultry Congress With First Place Demonstration

Hillsboroans topped the state again this week as Selmer Hendrickson and Lawrence Moran, Hillsboro route 3, were awarded first honors in the 4-H poultry production demonstration contest Thursday at Corvallis, where 91 Washington county 4-H boys and girls are registered at the club's 25th annual summer school.

In winning the contest, the Washington county pair wins a trip next month to Cleveland, Ohio, where they will represent Oregon in the national contest of the world poultry congress.

Emma Clark of Bend, Wilbur Nyberg of Tualatin and Bill Foster of Beaverton were named this week

in the Clatsop county 4-H pageant as Washington county's representatives on the girls' and boys' executive councils.

With 1975 boys and girls registered at the Corvallis summer school on Thursday, enrollment figures were the largest on record, and officials declared that late enrollees would boost the total to over 2000. Washington county's delegation this year was also the largest ever to attend the session.

The Washington county delegation at Corvallis will return Friday, June 16 before 1 p. m. instead of Saturday as had been previously announced, according to Assistant County Agent Palmer Torvond.
