

Police Issue Due for City Council Action

A variety of city business will be on the council agenda when that body convenes Wednesday night for its regular July session, according to City Recorder Ed Bowman.

For immediate attention will be the question of whether the city shall continue its three-man police system or return to a force of only two men. Authorized on a six-month trial basis by action taken in February, the three-man system will come to an end on July 9 unless the council passes favorably on a motion to retain the three-man system.

Mayor Supports

Mayor Rogers, who is actively campaigning for retention of the three-man police system, is expected to read a number of resolutions on the matter submitted by civic groups and individuals.

A petition urging the retention of the three-man police system has been widely circulated.

Second business of interest will be action on a request of the Southern Pacific company to vacate a part of the alley between First and Second avenues at Cedar in order to allow the Imperial Feed company to extend its buildings west across the alley.

Improvements on Seventh avenue between Baseline and Oak will be up for final hearing of objections and for possible passage. No opposition to the improvement, macadam surfacing of the street, is anticipated.

Tract Dedication Up

Dedication of the Hillis addition at the present extremity of North Fifth avenue will be considered. Howard Hillis, owner of the residence tract on which a number of new houses are now rising, some time ago submitted a deed to the city for the Fifth avenue extension right-of-way, but due to technical difficulties, the city has not yet officially accepted the deed. Dedication of the tract and acceptance of the street right-of-way will clear the way for Hillis to petition for street improvements.

Further discussions on Hillis's proposed building code may also be brought up. The city fathers tackled the tedious job of studying the proposed code at a special meeting Wednesday night.

Chas. W. Bloom Dies Friday

Charles W. Bloom, 67, resident of Hillsboro for many years and for the past nine years a resident of Hillsdale, died Friday in a Portland hospital. Funeral services were held Monday at the Donelson & Sewell chapel, Rev. Henry Hall officiating, with interment in the Fir Lawn cemetery.

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. Augusta Anderson, and two granddaughters, Helen and Elinor Anderson, all of Hillsdale. Mr. Bloom was born at Hillsdale, Sweden, February 27, 1872. Leaving his native land at the age of 19 years, he worked at the stone-cutting trade in Norway for seven years, and then went to the Hawaiian Islands, where he was overseer at a sugar plantation for three years.

Journeying to a new world, he went to work on a railroad building project in British Columbia and entered the United States about 1883. For 21 years, he was employed as foreman of the J. C. Hart sawmills in Washington county, and until nine years ago resided near Hillsboro. He went to live with his daughter at Hillsdale after his wife died on October 7, 1930.
