

Check Artist Pleads Guilty In Court Here

Aaron Weismuller, who was arrested by Portland police and turned over to Washington county authorities Tuesday on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, appeared before Circuit Judge R. Frank Peters Tuesday and entered a plea of guilty. Sentence was continued until Saturday, July 8.

He is charged with cashing a no-account check for \$24.30 at Bethany. Also charged with cashing bad checks in Multnomah county. Weismuller was sentenced to 90 days in jail there.

County Shows Improvement in Traffic Report

Washington county moved up to fifth place during the month of May for traffic accident improvement over the preceding month, it was announced this week by Earl Snell, secretary of state, in his traffic safety campaign report for Oregon.

For the fourth consecutive month Benton county stood at the top of the first division counties, Snell reported. Standings in the first division group, which includes the city of Portland, were as follows: Benton, first; Portland, second; Yamhill and Marion tied for third; Columbia and Polk, tied for fourth; Washington, fifth; Clatsop, sixth; Multnomah (exclusive of Portland), seventh; Clackamas, eighth.

Standings are based on accident reports sent to the secretary of state's office by sheriffs and police officials of each county. The improvement in total number of traffic accidents, number of persons injured and number killed is taken into consideration in computing the standings.

Salem Man Named Unemployment Head

Silas Gaiser, retired recently after serving five years as superintendent of the Salem public schools was Tuesday appointed acting administrator for the Oregon Unemployment commission. He succeeds D. A. Bulmore, who has served as administrator since early in the Martin administration.

Salem reports said the appointment came as a surprise to many officials, as Leon Davis, secretary of the Hillsboro chamber of commerce, and Homer Carpenter, Portland broker, had been mentioned prominently in connection with the position of administrator.

Rear-end collision accidents totaled 2,022 during the first quarter of 1939, the secretary of state's office revealed today. There were 90 cars with faulty tail lights involved in accidents, while 751 accidents occurred while cars were backing up. Excessive speed figured in 34 per cent of accident causes which resulted in traffic fatalities during the month of April, figures compiled by Earl Snell, secretary of state, revealed. A total of 473 drivers reported excessive speed as a factor in accidents. Nine of these resulted in deaths.

Safe Driving Appeal Made

An appeal for residents of Oregon to join a state-wide drive to reduce traffic accidents during the coming Fourth of July holidays was voiced today by Earl Snell, secretary of state, who issued a statement pointing out that during the first four days of July last year, five persons were killed and 118 injured in traffic accidents in the state.

The first four days of July, 1938, saw 475 traffic accidents on the highways and streets of the state, 17 per cent of the total accidents reported for the entire month of July, Snell said.

July traffic accidents last year claimed a toll of 36 lives; in the year before that they took 41 lives and the year before that, 38 lives. Approximately one-fourth of all traffic accidents during each July of these three years resulted in injuries or deaths.

"This year the Fourth of July comes on Tuesday and many Oregon residents will again have a three or four-day holiday with the consequent heavy travel on the highways and streets of the state," Snell's statement said.

"Unless every driver in Oregon takes upon himself the definite feeling of responsibility for the safety of those using the highways and streets during the period of congestion, we may expect to see lives lost each day of that holiday period."
