

MacKenzie Back From a Circle Of the States

Mr. and Mrs. H. L. MacKenzie and sons Donald and Robert returned Tuesday afternoon from an extended trip which took them on a circle of the United States and into Canada.

They went from here by automobile to Vancouver, B. C., and then by way of the Canadian Pacific to Chicago, where they met Mrs. MacKenzie's brother, Vic MacKenzie, national liaison officer of the American Legion. In Detroit they secured a new car and then drove into Canada, where they visited Quebec, Ottawa, Toronto and Montreal. The parliament buildings at Ottawa provided much interest for them and they attended sessions of parliament.

Back into the United States stops included Niagara Falls, Boston, Lexington, Concord, and many places of historical interest, and then into New York for several days. The buildings and exhibits at the New York World's fair were very impressive, they said.

While in New York, Mr. MacKenzie and the boys went out to Bedloe Island to get a "close-up" of the Goddess of Liberty. A WPA crew was repairing the statue and the elevator was not running. However, they were game and climbed to the top, approximately 22 stories, on spiral stairs to see the view.

In Washington, D. C., they were privileged to see King George and Queen Elizabeth from the steps of the capitol building, through the courtesy of Congressman James Mott. They also attended sessions of the senate and house, visited Mount Vernon and other places of interest.

From there they went on down to Florida and across through the southern states to Los Angeles, where two sisters of Mrs. MacKenzie, Mrs. Bessie Byrnes and Mrs. Hazel Goodman, were visited for several days. At the Golden Gate exposition in San Francisco they were particularly impressed by the fighting at night and the Cavalcade. The lighting, they said, was the most beautiful they had seen.

The two boys secured autographs of Bob Feller, famous Cleveland pitcher, and other well known major league ball players.

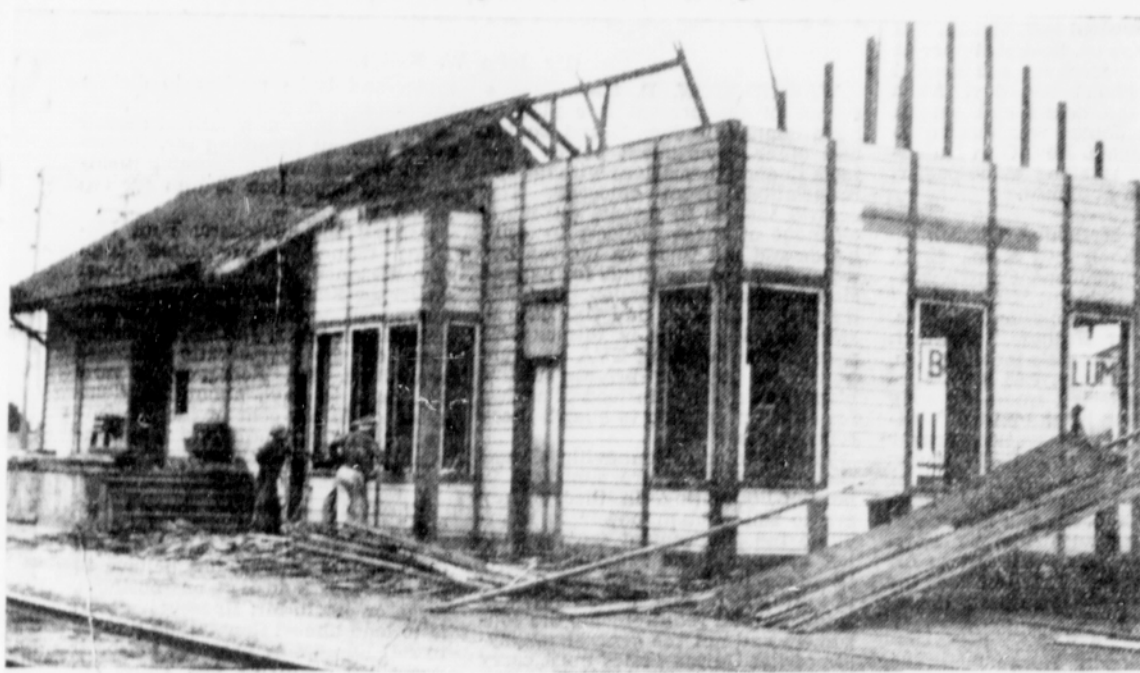

Alpine Flowers, Fossils Sought By Local People

LAUREL—Mr. and Mrs. Ben Cooley returned Sunday evening from a ten-day auto trip into the mountains in the eastern and southern part of the state. They were searching for Alpine flowers and fossils for a rockery at their home here. They first drove through the John Day country to Ukiah over a very mountainous and narrow forest service road in the Blue mountains to Baker, Wallawa Lake, Halfway and to the Matterhorn, where they could get a view of the mountains in all directions. A new fall of snow made everything very beautiful. They then went to Homestead and crossed the Snake river to the Red Lodge mine in Idaho.

Returning to Oregon they drove over an old mining road to Huntington. Mrs. Cooley says it is the most narrow and dangerous road she ever drove over and she has driven across it a few times. Reaching Ontario they drove to Jordan valley which was named for Mrs. Cooley's great uncle, John Jordan, who came here in the gold rush of 49 and operated a toll-gate. While traveling to Diamond the Cooleys encountered a miniature cloudburst. "And not so miniature either," says Mrs. Cooley. The mud was four or five inches deep but they finally reached French Glen, where Mrs. Cooley's department of Agriculture has a wild game bird refuge of 165,000 acres.

The travelers then went to the Steen mountains in the southeastern part of the state, then to Lakeview across Hart mountain to the 250,000-acre refuge. They saw only a few antelope, as most of them were back in the hills.

Driving to Bend the wind was very strong, almost a hurricane, the air hot, dry and dusty, so when they reached Elk Lake Lodge, in the mountains near Three Sisters, they felt they had gained a paradise. Remaining there two days they took one ten-mile hike and one seven-mile. From there they came home, having driven over 2000 miles. They felt amply repaid as they had the car trunk full of the things for which they were searching.

Irene Hansen of Bethany will attend the 37th international Christian Endeavor convention in Cleveland, Ohio, July 6-11 as a delegate of Washington county.

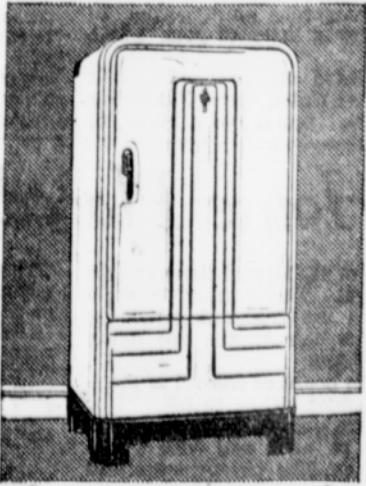
