

Hillsboro Tourists Encounter Tropic Heat, Snow in Journey To Havana, New York, Canada

Traveling by rail, water and air on a 15,000-mile trip which took them through all kinds of weather from tropic heat to snow, Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Weil returned to Hillsboro this week after more than ten weeks of vacationing in California, the Panama Canal Zone, Havana, New York City, Philadelphia, Washington, D. C., Nashville, and other points in the United States, and Lake Louise, Banff and Vancouver, B. C. in Canada.

Their journey included visits to such world-famous resorts as the American cities, an Annapolis graduation, a brief stay in the national capital when the king and queen of Great Britain were visiting, and lodgings at Canada's most famous summer resorts.

Week at Fair

The Weils left here by train on April 30, arriving the next day in San Francisco, where they stayed for an entire week to see the Golden Gate international exposition. Embarking on a coast steamer May 6, they arrived at Los Angeles the day following and immediately booked passage on the steamship "City of Los Angeles," which carried 75 passengers and was bound for New York.

Mr. Weil was feted on ship board May 12 with a party celebrating his and one other passenger's birthday. Cakes were fitted with candles (Mr. Weil did not say how many) and the entire passenger list helped celebrate.

Kept Diary

"It was an extremely hot day off the coast of Mexico," Mr. Weil read from a diary of the trip.

Additional honor was accorded Mr. Weil some time later when he was awarded first prize for wearing the most original costume at a masquerade ball on ship board. The "original" costume, Mr. Weil explained, was a pair of sandals and a barrel with ends out supplied by the steward.

There was always something doing on the ship, the Hillsboro couple related, with shuffleboard games, motion pictures, daily appearances of the well-known "ship news" dances, cocktail parties and special dinners keeping the ship guests occupied most of the time.

Tour Cities

First port of call was Panama City, where the Weils departed for a day's tour of neighboring cities, Balboa, Cristobal and Colon. Their mode of transportation was horse-drawn phaetons.

Going through the Panama locks into the Caribbean, the "City of Los Angeles" docked on May 20 at Havana, Cuba, which Mr. Weil remembers as the most interesting city seen on his entire trip. Most impressive about the island city, he said, are the narrow, cobblestone streets, iron grillwork windows with no glass panes and the churches on a majority of the houses.

Church Impressive

One of the most famous buildings in Havana, the Hillsboro couple related, is the church of "Our Lady of Mercy" in which murals and paintings are 175 years old. Among famous painters who contributed to the church's colorful interior was Leonardo Da Vinci. Mr. Weil said. Also of interest is the fact jewels and gold forming part of the interior decorations were donated by grateful persons reportedly cured and healed at the church.

Other items and places of interest to the tourists were the many street vendors, policemen directing traffic from stools under sun-protective umbrellas, the abundance of lottery tickets on sale, a cigar factory, tropical beer gardens, the Trocadero distillery, Coudade park and Presidente place along the seaway, the Maine monument composed of a huge figure representing the United States with one arm around the shoulder of a smaller figure representing Cuba, and the Colon cemetery, where caskets are not buried but set up on monuments. The Havana tour occupied one day.

Arrive at New York

The statue of liberty in New York harbor was passed by the "City of Los Angeles" at 11 a. m. May 23. "An awe-inspiring sight," Weil related.

Most interesting by far of anything seen at the New York fair is the General Motors exhibit, Weil said. Visitors are seated on moving cars to view the imaginative reproductions of highways and buildings as they are now and as they will be in 1960. Most entertaining of any place visited was Billy Rose's "Aqueduct," where Johnny Weissmuller and Eleanor Holm are the featured attractions. The audience witnesses the swimming exhibition from above, giving the show a very different appeal.

Witness Graduation

At Annapolis, where the Weils witnessed graduation exercises for a class of U. S. midshipmen, they joined Mrs. R. J. Nicol and Mrs. Marie Dismore of Hillsboro. Mrs. Dismore's stepson, Bob, was one of 30 midshipmen to graduate with honors. Seen in New York City were Mr. and Mrs. H. L. MacKenzie and sons of this city, who were also vacationing.

Traveling by plane from New York, Mr. and Mrs. Weil spent a day in Washington, D. C., seeing the king and queen of England and President and Mrs. Roosevelt while there.

R. H. Craddock Dies; Famed As Detective

Robert Herchel Craddock, 74, retired Portland police detective and resident of Hillsboro, for several years, died Sunday at his home in Hillsboro. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at Portland Crematorium with members of Hawthorne Masonic lodge participating. Arrangements were in charge of Donelson and Sewell.

He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. R. Frank Peters of Hillsboro. Mr. Craddock had figured prominently in numerous outstanding cases in his 33 years on the Portland police force.

Mr. Craddock was born in Missouri. He came to Portland in 1902 and was appointed to the police force February 6, 1905. An interest in guns began when he was a child, was continued into manhood and Mr. Craddock became the outstanding authority in ballistics in this section. He also was considered a handwriting expert and the two specialties won him prominence in police detective work. He solved a number of murders and in one case proved that a convicted man was innocent of murder. Mr. Craddock obtained the release of this man. Another person ultimately confessed the crime.

He was promoted to a detective in 1911. He served until June, 1933, when he retired. He was a member of Hawthorne Masonic lodge, Royal Arch Masons and the Woodlawn lodge of Odd Fellows.

Mr. Craddock was at one time national champion pistol shot, winning many contests and was a member of the Portland Revolver club and National Rifle association.
