Celebrating her ninetieth birthday anniversary Saturday, happy and in good health, was the good fortune of Mrs. Esther Cornelius, widow of the late B. P. Cornelius. Surrounded by members of her family and receiving calls from many friends, the day passed pleasantly for her. The living room of her home on East Baseline street was a mass of beautiful flowers presented by relatives and friends, and many congratulatory cards were received from absent friends.

Among relatives from a distance who were guests at the dinner in her home and to spend the day with her were her only sister, Mrs. Eva Crews of Orland, Cal.; and two nieces, Mrs. Ella Eggerson of Provo, Utah, and Mrs. Flora Davenport of Parker, Idaho. A lifelong friend who called during the day was Mrs. Mildred Bartholomew of Hillsboro, who was celebrating her eighty-third birthday anniversary that day.

She is the grandmother of eight. Mail Carriers Here Have Long Service Records

Almost three decades have passed since John M. Ryan, Hillsboro city mail carrier delivered his first postal message for "Uncle Sam" and only one year his junior the matter of continued service is Arthur Miltenberger, beginning his 29th year on Hillsboro route 1.

The veteran mail carriers were brought together for a newspaper picture last week and exchanged recollections of experiences in their many years of service. Ryan, who started carrying mail on Hillsboro route 3 in 1910, recalls having been ambushed once by a pair of would-be robbers. They were discouraged in their intended crime by a revolver which Ryan lost no time in producing and one of the men was later arrested and faced with federal charges. Ryan has served on his present city beat since September 1, 1916.

Miltenberger, who has delivered mail continuously for 28 years on Hillsboro route 1, estimates his daily meanderings for "Uncle Sam" have taken him a distance equivalent to 12 trips around the world, about 302,400 miles. During that time, he has outlasted the usefulness of seven horses, three buggies and nine automobiles, he says.

Directed by the state department of education and sponsored in Washington county by the county school superintendent's office under the direction of O. B. Kraus, with Gordon Grimm as field supervisor, the federal emergency education program is reaching into all of Washington county's large communities.
