Rules for Queen Contest for Scholls Festival Announced

Contestants must record their sales in person before 6 every Monday and Thursday between now and August 3. The results of the contest will be posted each Monday and Thursday at the following stores: Potter & Trask; Bunnell's Store; and the Artimage Store at Midway Corner. The contest lady selling the most script will be queen and will receive a trip with expenses paid to the Eggenorth League Institute at Falls City from August 5 to August 12. Four contestants having next highest score will become princesses. The queen and her princesses must remain on the festival grounds until dismissed by the chaperone. The queen and her princess will be entitled to free admission to the various activities on the grounds including a free dinner.

The following is the valuation of the script and the number of votes each valuation gives the contestants: 3c, 50 votes; 10c, 100 votes; 25c, 250 votes; 50c, 500 votes; \$1, 1000 votes; \$2, 2000 votes; \$5, 5000 votes.

Following is a list of attractions which will be on the grounds at the festival: Popcorn and candy booth, ice cream cones, snappy hot dogs, dinner cafeteria, style, a fortune telling booth, fancy country store. In the evening there will be movies and a fine program.
