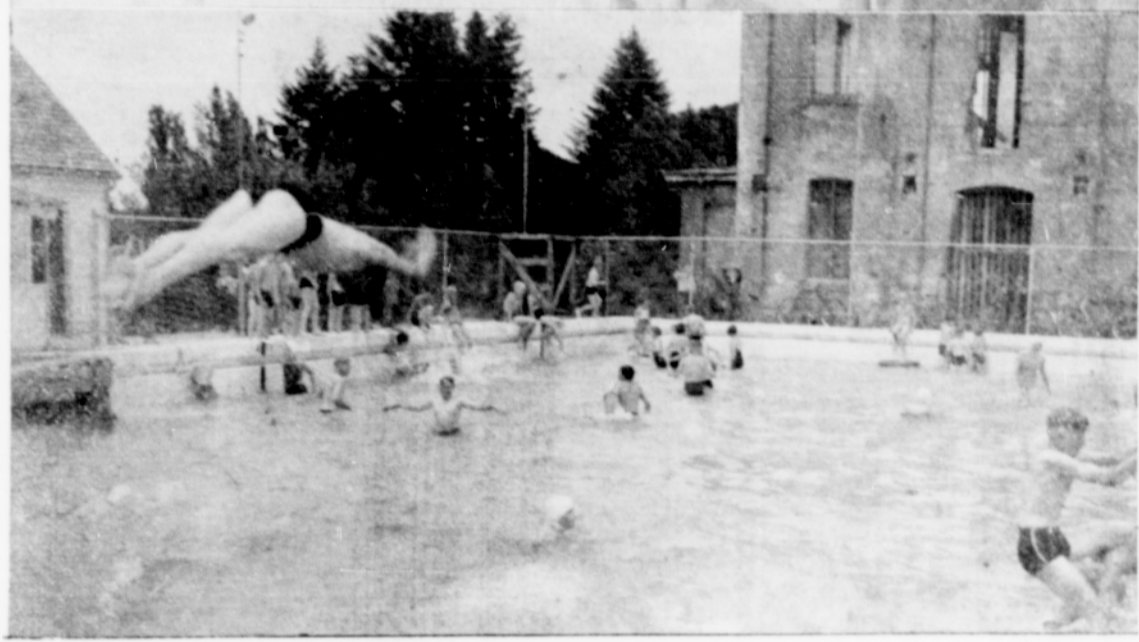
Leave for Ohio

Ordinances for Beaverton Are Consolidated

BEAVERTON—Last Thursday a history making meeting was held by the town council. Seven ordinances were passed, the largest number ever passed at one time in the life of the town. This comes as a culmination of a co-operation with the League of Oregon Cities project to codify all ordinances. The first ordinance was one repealing existing laws which had become outdated and were duplicates in some instances, and substituting one ordinance embodying the good features of each of those repealed.

Nine ordinances pertaining to disorderly conduct were thus brought up to date and six ordinances were eliminated as being ineffective due to the fact that liquor control is governed by the state law. Four traffic regulations were recalled, having been invalidated by the Oregon state traffic code.

The remaining six ordinances concerned the governing of traffic; the designation of certain streets as through streets, restricting erection of bill boards, governing disorderly conduct, prohibiting the creating and maintaining of public nuisances, pertaining to the correcting of an earlier ordinance upon the subject of street vacation.

In addition, two ordinances which have been held invalidated by court decision were repealed. These concerned pinball games and wholesale trade vehicle licenses.

Thursday's action reduced the number of active ordinances on the town books to 29, as opposed to the former burdensome 189.

Officials attending the memorable meeting were Mayor McCluskey; former Mayor Lyndon Meyers; City Attorney P. L. Patterson; A. L. Amacher, auditor; and councilmen.
