

Reckless Driver To Pay \$25 Cost Wreck Damages

Robert William Teschner, 25, Beaverton, was lodged in the county jail on an open charge Saturday night following an accident on the Tualatin highway near Huber. Betty Altshin of Hazeldeale was the driver of the other car involved in the mishap, which occurred about 10:30 p. m. No one was injured seriously.

Appearing in A. W. Havens justice court Monday, Teschner entered a plea of guilty. He was released on agreeing to pay a \$25 fine, court costs and to reimburse Miss Altshin for damages to her car.

Fire Hazard Said Increased

Warning as well as appeal were contained in an ultimatum from Fire Marshal Wilbur Dillon this week that the coming of dry season has so increased the city's fire hazard that strict enforcement of the fire permit ordinance has been called for.

J. C. Cawse, Schefflin, Dies

Joseph C. Cawse, 87, Cornelius, three times a farmer for the past 64 years, died Monday at his home after a prolonged illness. Funeral services were held Wednesday in the Donelson and Sewell chapel with interment in the Tualatin Plains cemetery.

Surviving are two sons, John and Joseph, both of Cornelius; five daughters, Mrs. Adelaide Andrews, Cornelius; Mrs. Maude Jackson, Los Angeles, Cal.; Mrs. Mabel Voss, Spokane, Wash.; Mrs. Fannie Grindle, Portland; and Mrs. Bertie Galloway, of Coaleo, Wash. He is also survived by seven grandchildren. Mrs. Alice Norberg and Helen Grindle of Portland; Loren and Alvin Cawse, Donald, Juanita and Kathryn Cawse, all of the Schefflin community and three great-grandchildren of Portland.

Joseph C. Cawse was born on July 21, 1851, in Cornwall, England, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Cawse. He was preceded in death by his wife, Sarah, to whom he was married in 1876 in England. She died December 9, 1902. Mr. Cawse started farming near Schefflin in about 1875 and retired from active work about ten years ago when he was taken by illness.

Mr. Cawse was one of the pioneers in growing hops in this county, having a 35-acre hop farm, which at that time was considered a large farm. He was also one of the first to run a threshing machine and horse-power baler, in company with his late brother, Charles Cawse.

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Health Diet

Is Planned for Boy Scouts

According to the menu and food lists prepared for Boy Scouts who will attend district camp in the Elizabeth Ireland park starting July 20, the boys will be eating vitamin-packed meals with eggs, butter and milk constituting a large part of their daily diet.

Milk supplied fresh every day will be sold at the camp trading post and Scout officials are suggesting that each pair of Scouts purchase at least one and, if possible, two quarts per day. Each set of partners will be provided with a camp cook book on arrival and cooking instructions will be on hand at meal times.

A complete list of foods to be taken to camp by each set of two Scouts follows:

Six-pound cans soup (any kind), 16 medium potatoes, 1/2-pound hamburger, 2 No. 2 cans peas, 5 one-pound loaves bread, 2 pounds butter, 2 No. 2 1/2 cans peaches, 2 pounds fig bars, 1/2-pound stewing beef, 1 bunch carrots, 1 pound dry onions, 1 can salmon, 1 box jelly, 1 No. 2 1/2 can pears, 1-pound box graham crackers, 1/2-pound cupped beef, 1 No. 2 can corn, 1 cup rice, 1 cup macaroni, 1 pound Tillamook cheese, 1 No. 2 can string beans, 1 small can corned beef, 1 small box Rye Crisp, 1 dozen oranges, 1 can salmon, 1 box jelly, chocolate pudding, 1/2-pound sandwich meat, 1 pound dried apricots, 1 pound peanut butter, 1 small head lettuce, 1/2-pound mayonnaise, 1 No. 2 can pork and beans, 1 bunch green onions, 1 pound raisins, 4 apples, 1 small can tuna fish, 1 box Pop or other cold cereal, 16 eggs, 1/2-pound bacon, 1/2-pound cocoa, 2 cups oatmeal (quick cooking), 1 pound pancake flour, 2 pounds sugar, 12 dried prunes, 2 large cans condensed milk, 1 cup salt, 1/2-pound lard, 1 tablespoon cinnamon, 1 tablespoon pepper, matches in tin box.
