There will be a joint meeting of the city council and the city planning commission on Tuesday evening, July 25, at 8 o'clock to consider the request of the baseball club to construct a board fence around the ball park, according to J. W. Harney, city manager.

H. L. MacKenzie, chairman of the finance committee, reported that more than enough has been subscribed to by Hillsboro businessmen to underwrite all expenses of visiting teams.

Bun Hixon, coach of the Hillsboro Junior Legion team, who has given his time and efforts to Junior Legion ball for the past nine years, described as "inspiring" the wide spread enthusiasm over Junior Legion ball that is being shown in Hillsboro and all over the county.

"I'm glad to see it," he said. "It is an important part of the county's youth program. And when the whole county gets behind such a program, it's really giving the kids a break." Hixon then pointed out that eight of every ten players in the Tualatin Valley baseball league got their start in Junior Legion ball in Hillsboro. He also predicted that a city baseball team will be organized in Hillsboro as soon as the park is enclosed.

Parade Planned
H. L. Burnett, chairman of the baseball parade committee, reported at the meeting that officials of the various teams to compete in the state tournament will be invited to march in the parade. Negotiations are also being made to have the Portland American Legion post drum corps and the Jay Stevens disaster car come here, he said. The local Sea Scouts will participate in the parade, he announced.

Players visiting here during the two-day tournament will be housed in the Shute park auditorium, located just across the Tualatin highway from the baseball park. A public address system for the park will be installed at the park by an oil company.

Games will get under way promptly at 1:30 p. m. it was declared at the meeting. News articles on the tournament have been sent out to about 100 papers throughout the state.
