Grange Opposes Freight Law

Two resolutions were adopted by the Hillsboro Grange in regular session here Thursday night, according to Mrs. G. C. Chase, secretary.

The first resolution put the grange on record as favoring the movement to establish uniform traffic laws throughout the nation. The second declared the group in opposition to a bill now pending in Congress which would place water and motor transportation under the jurisdiction of the Interstate Commerce commission.

Discussion preceding passage of the latter resolution brought out opinions that the proposed law would raise freight rates paid by farmers. It was also resolved that copies of the resolution would be sent to Oregon senators and representatives in congress.

Sewage Plant Draws Interest

Hillsboro's sewage disposal plant, the first of its kind in the state, has been visited by engineers from every state in the union except Texas.

James Burns, plant operator, in speaking before the Hillsboro Rotary club last Thursday, J. L. Anderson was chairman.

The plant, he said, is recognized all over the nation as a model, and many cities have used similar plans after noting the success of the operations here.

Burns said the plant was running two-thirds of capacity now, that it will take care of a population of from 4,000 to 5,000 and that the capacity can be increased without much cost. Cost of operation is small, according to Burns.

Industrial waste handled amounts to 400,000 gallons daily as against 350,000 domestic, the speaker said. The \$12,500 industrial plant is paid for out of revenues from the cannery, it was pointed out.

Woods Worker Is Crushed
A woods accident in the Stinson Lumber company's holding, Hillsboro, brought instant death Friday to Carl Gray, 42, of Yamhill, a donkey engineer at the Laughlin and Stinson operations, sub-contracting for the Stinson firm.

According to Coroner Fred Sewell, who conducted an investigation, Gray was crushed by a heavy timber which smashed through the roof of his donkey cab when a log supporting a spar tree broke away. The accident happened at about 7 a. m.

Gray was a former resident of Forest Grove. He is survived by his widow Gertrude, three children, a twin brother, Earl, two brothers, Luther and Benny, all of Yamhill, and two sisters, Mrs. Roy Hulse of McMinnville and Mrs. Pearl Hankins of Yamhill.

The body was taken to the Forest Grove Undertaking parlors.
