

First Class in Safety Driving Series to Be Conducted at 2 p. m. Today; Seven Sessions Planned

A safety driving school at which residents of the Hillsboro area may learn to drive an automobile under the competent instruction of a trained teacher, will be held in Hillsboro starting today (Thursday). It was announced this week by Earl Snell, secretary of state, who is sponsoring the school as a part of his state-wide campaign for traffic safety.

Registrations may be left at the city recorder's office in Hillsboro. The course is open to anyone 15 years of age or older and no operators' licenses are required. Students will furnish their own cars and will assemble for their first class at the union high school here.

Seven Classes

Classes will be held each Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock during the seven weeks of the course. At each session students will receive instruction in one phase of the operation of an automobile, including starting and stopping the motor, shifting gears, parking, handling the car in traffic, starting and stopping on hills and the general care of the car. Rules and regulations pertaining to the operation of motor vehicles in the state of Oregon will be explained during the course of the school.

"Driving an automobile is like playing golf. If you don't have proper instruction while you are learning, you may develop bad habits which are very hard to break," Snell declared. "We have found in these classes that many persons have difficulty in mastering some phase of the mechanical operation of a car but under competent instruction these difficulties are overcome and the student becomes a good, safe driver."

Practice Encouraged

Persons who have never driven a car and those who have some driving experience but desire to improve their technique are invited to enroll in the school. After each session, students are encouraged to practice the procedure they learned during the interim until the next class.

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New School Body to Select Other Members

Ex-officio members of the Washington county commission, a school district reorganization, adopted a resolution at their initial meeting this week that the other three members of the seven-man commission will be selected from districts to be most affected by the new state law.

The ex-officio fourness are O. B. Kraus, county school superintendent, chairman; H. D. Kerkman, county judge; A. M. Janssen, chairman of the county non-high school, and J. E. Carpenter, county assessor.

In accordance with a new law passed by the last legislature, it will be the commission's duty to single out small districts where it might be more economical for the school children to be taken by bus to a larger school nearby and it shall be within the commission's power to call for a special election on the issue in the district concerned.

Final power of decision will rest in the hands of the voters, who may approve or reject the commission's recommendations. Probably not more than a dozen of the county's over 100 districts will be effected by the new law. Chairman Kraus said.

Another meeting of the commission will be called within the next week or ten days, he said.
