Cow is Only Animal Not Displaced By Mechanized Equipment on Modern Farm of Gustav Krause

A "contented" Jersey cow is the only animal left on the Gustav Krause farm south of Cornelius, where tractors and other mechanized equipment have completely displaced the traditional span of horses.

Krause has one of the most highly mechanized farms in the county, with tractors and wheeled implements for every task. The Jersey cow is the only exception and Krause doubts that he will ever find a machine to take her place.

Worker since 1908
The strictly modern farm covers 210 acres, with 100 acres cleared. Forty-two are in alfalfa and walnuts. Except for five years spent in studying at Oregon State college, Krause has worked the soil continually since 1908, when he purchased the place.

During those short 31 years, he has seen his fields completely replaced by machine sheds and now owns about \$10,000 worth of machine equipment. When not in use the "iron steeds" require no feeding and when they are in service they don't get tired, Krause comments.

Repairs on Farm
One of the most surprising bits of modernization on the Krause farm is a tile and concrete machine repair shop, where a broken "bone" can be easily mended or even replaced and never necessitates a "shooting." The repair equipment

embraces almost every tool needed to keep his machines in shape, including a complete welding outfit.

Another mechanized feature of the Krause farm is a seed cleaning plant which has an hourly output of 1½ tons of Australian field peas for seeding.

Hereford Cow on A. P. Ireland Farm Near Greenville Tops Honor Roll for Fat Production

A five-year-old Hereford cow belonging to A. P. Ireland, whose farm is between Forest Grove and Banks, topped the list of honor cows listed by the Washington County Herd Improvement association for the month of June.

In milk for 305 days, this cow produced 16,469 pounds of milk containing 542.3 pounds of butterfat, the monthly report shows. Close to this record is another five-year-old Judy, a pure-bred Jersey owned by C. H. Bamford, Forest Grove.

Judy's production for the year was 9696 pounds of milk containing 573.3 pounds of butterfat.

A total of 1472 cows in 60 herds were tested in the association during the month ending June 30, 1939. The total average for all cows tested during the month was 701.7 pounds of milk and 31.57 pounds of fat. Of the total, 449 cows each produced over 40 pounds of fat.

The 33-cow herd of C. H. Buchanan Jr. again won top place among high herds in the "over 20 cows" classification. Each of Buchanan's pure-bred and grade Jerseys produced an average of 797 pounds of milk and 43.94 pounds of butterfat.

A "believe-it-or-not" story of a team of horses that out-pulled a farm tractor was being told this week by Hillsboro firemen who witnessed the incredible feat in a Washington county field.

The strength test came about as an accident, according to Fireman A. L. Brock, one of the witnesses. The rural fire rig had been driven to the E. E. Rice farm southwest of Mountdendale, Brock said, to put out a dangerous haystack fire. Because the burning pile was threatening a nearby building, it was decided to pull the stack into the clear. A large beam was laid along the base of the pile with a span of horses harnessed to one side and the tractor chained to the other.

When the time came to pull, the horses repeatedly left the tractor struggling behind with its end of the beam, Brock said.

Distribution Of Phosphate Slated for Fall

Washington county farmers will be able this fall, and again next spring to secure triple superphosphate under an A. A. A. farm program arrangement, according to Will Steen of Milton, chairman of the state agricultural conservation committee.

Approximately 2000 tons of the fertilizer have been ordered, and will be distributed as "grants of aid" to program co-operators. In other words, farmers will be able to obtain it this fall and pay for it through deductions from their conservation payments.

A requirement is that the fertilizer be used only on lands devoted to soil conserving crops such as perennial pasture, alfalfa, red clover and similar grasses and legumes. The program is similar to one last spring in which 1000 tons were distributed.

County conservation committees will be in charge of distribution in this and 22 other counties.
