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Mrs. Anna Geier Observes 90th Birthday Here

Mrs. Anna Geier, a resident of Hillsboro more than 50 years, celebrated her ninetieth birthday anniversary Wednesday at her home at Sixth and Cedar streets. Mrs. Geier, a German by birth, came to Hillsboro with her husband June 15, 1889, living first in what was then known as the Chenette Row on Main street, across from the court house. Later her husband built the home in which she has lived continuously since.

Before coming to Hillsboro, they lived at Philadelphia, Pa., in California three years, Vancouver, Wash., and Portland.

Mrs. Geier, who died in 1901, was a musician and artist in her native country, his specialty being the painting of theatre stage curtains and scenery. He carried out some of his artistic ideas in painting his home, and some of our citizens recall that as small boys they thought the house was haunted. Mrs. Frank Mitchell owns a 71-year-old melody which Mr. Geier took with him to play for dances when he first came here.

Mrs. Geier in spite of her 90 years, has never had a pair of fitted glasses, but is an avid reader, and translates our language into German as she reads. She has always had good health, gets up at daylight and goes to rest when darkness comes.
