Kelley Reports Good Crops in Northwest Section

"Good crops, green everywhere," says Jack W. Kelley of the Washington Hotel, who left here several weeks ago with Mrs. Kelley for a month's vacation trip. His letter, written from Conrad, Montana, August 24, follows:

"We are having a grand trip. Two days in Vancouver, B. C., a beautiful city with its many parks, lovely sparkling harbors and so much natural scenery, and its very scenic mountains right at its back door. We became more in love with the place each time we see it. Had the good fortune to meet Mr. and Mrs. Dave Cooper. They were vacationing here and at Victoria.

"To get into Eastern Washington we had to retrace our steps to Everett. From there we went over to a new highway, the Stevens Pass. The Eastern terminus of the pass is Cashmere, the distance as I recall is about 100 miles, and is a beautiful trip, the highway follows an easy grade, always in sight of towering peaks, and rivers, rippling, gurgling, that would delight the heart of any fisherman. We had only golf clubs with us—but that day, for once, would gladly have exchanged them for fishing rods. You and all of your much traveled friends would delight in crossing Stevens Pass, an unforgettable trip. We so often think and speak of Oregon as the state of scenic wonders, but we find as we drive around there are other areas not to be overlooked. From Cashmere we drove north some forty miles to Lake Chelan. I haven't words to describe its beauty, but I know of a certain public speaker who would describe it something like this—'A liquid jewel set in the heart of the Alpine forest.' Well, anyway, it is 50 miles long, most entirely surrounded with high mountain peaks."

"We next visited Roosevelt's Valley—Grand Coulee dam. Well, to me it is just another dam, and if I had missed it altogether, I would not have felt badly. From there to Spokane, and on to Wallace, Idaho, Missoula and Helena, Montana, and then here to visit Kathryn English and other relatives.

"To date we have traveled about 1500 miles and the whole distance the fruit and stock look fine. The grain crop in Montana has never been better. A nice rain would be welcome, but it has not been too hot any place except at the Grand Coulee dam and that section of Eastern Washington. In another few days we will be in Yellowstone and Grand Teton parks."
