

Recognize Your Home Town? Hillsboro from the Air



Here we are, folks, 4000 feet over Washington county's largest city and seat of government, Hillsboro. These buildings we're approaching—the ones with the sun glistening white on the roof—are the Terminal Ice and Cold Storage and B. E. Maling plants, two of Hillsboro's largest industries. The Haley cannery, a recent addition to this city's industrial life, may be seen as a cluster of white buildings farther to the right and about five city blocks ahead of us, which is, incidentally, east. The Tualatin Valley highway is the next street to the right of the Maling plant. By following it east, and then right at the wide corner, you will locate a clump of fir, Shute park and the Washington county fairgrounds, where the annual three-day fair gets under way today. The highway, you will notice, turns to the left just beyond the park and veers off to the southeast. That's the way to Beedsville, Aloha, Beaverton and Portland. That little string which meanders and parallels the highway at the park and fairgrounds is the Southern Pacific railroad. By following it back

this way and one block past the cluster of Maling buildings, you'll find Hillsboro's Main street, which runs east and west through the business district. One block east of the railroad on the left side of Main street is a clump of trees with a large building situated in its center. That's the Washington county courthouse. Two blocks east of the railroad on Main street is Second avenue. Buildings in the blocks east and west of this street constitute the city's business section. That oval track on the northeast edge of the city? That's the union high track and athletic field. The high school gymnasium and class buildings are just this way from it. Just above and to the right is the P. A. Anderson addition. The road which angles off to the northeast just beyond the athletic field is Cornell road, which would eventually take you into Portland by way of Cedar Mill. We're right over what is known as the Garden Tracts now, folks. Been quite a lot of new building down there in the last year, you'll notice.

In a minute now we'll be flying over the Hillis section. It's located on this side of the first north and south street this way from the expanse of grain fields north of the high school. There are two new houses almost completed, you'll notice, on the south end of this addition. The large building just this way from the Hillis addition is the B. W. Barnes school and the road which turns off to the left just north and east from the school building is the Cornelius Pass road. If any of you folks happen to live down there, you'll probably be able to locate your own house. Incidentally, in case any of you good people don't know who's hands your lives are in, the guy handling the stick is Ed Ball, manager of the Hillsboro airport. Who? That fellow with all the special aerial photographic equipment? That's Glen Paine, a Hillsboro photographer who takes an interest in his work. Watch him. He's taking a picture now. Whoops, watch out, Glen...
