## Hilhi Pounds Grove for 8-0 Grid Victory

A touchdown run in the first quarter by Bill Foelker, Hilhi, fullback, and a safety early in the third period gave Coach Reece Hathorn's Spartans an 8-0 grid victory here Friday night over their traditional rivals, the Forest Grove Vikings.

The game showed teams in need of line strengthening, with frequent fumbles, blocked kicks and stunted passes spoiling offenses. Dead-eye passing and brilliant line plays by Ike Tsugawa, left halfback, and steady heads-up ball-packing by Foelker were outstanding for the Hillsboro team and heavy line plunging by Frank Viking left halfback, showed best for the Forest Grove team.

**Punt Blocked**—The touchdown play, one of the three high points in the game, came on a forward pass from Tsugawa to Foelker. Forest Grove first saw danger when Wierneck's punt was blocked on his own 25 yard line.

Early in the third period, Hillsboro had the ball on the Forest Grove's 40-yard line, second and ten. Ike Tsugawa managed to make one yard through right tackle and on the next play caught the Viking warriors completely off guard with a quick kick. Sagar received it on his own five and was immediately stopped by Ross.

**Safety Scored**—Frank played back in punt formation, knocked the pignin from his own end zone and found a wall of Spartan men in front of him. The ball bounded backwards and three Spartan men scrambled after it. O'Donnell and Naught finally falling on it for a safety.

The next few plays found the Spartans again in the shadow of Viking goal posts. Grove kicked from the 20. Foelker received on the Hilhi 45 and returned it to the Viking 43-stripe. A fake reverse through left tackle sent Foelker to the 38. Tsugawa skirted right end for 17 yards to the Grove 21, picked up another three through left tackle, failed to gain at left tackle on the next play.

**Forced out of Bounds**—Third down and seven to go, Ike faded way back, shot a quick forward pass diagonally to the left.

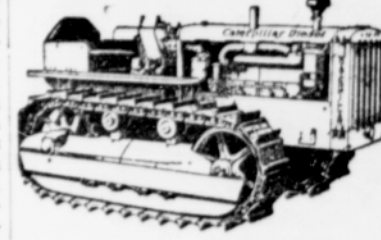

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## Northwest Crops and Livestock Bring Income of 231 Millions

While the cash income received by farmers of Oregon and Washington from crops, livestock and livestock products during 1938 did not equal that of 1937, the total is a very substantial one that indicates the productivity of the great Northwest. Of the above total, \$43,758,000\* was received for milk in the two states, according to figures recently released by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Interest in dairying will reach a high point in the Northwest Oct. 7 to 14, when for the first time West of the Rockies, the National Dairy Show Exhibit will be shown at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition in Portland, enroute to the Golden Gate Exposition.
