# "Traveling Flag" Arrives at W. R. C. Meeting Friday

The Newberg corps brought the "Traveling Flag" to the local corps, the presentation being made by Mrs. Lois Way, president, assisted by her members in a very impressive ceremony. Mrs. Jessie Boyes of the visiting corps, led in singing "God Bless America."

Mrs. Lucille Hillis Magnus, president of Carter W. R. C. of McMinnville, who was responsible for obtaining the flag for District No. 3, and starting it on its travels, gave a talk on promoting patriotism and encouraging the proper use of the flag. District No. 3 of the Department of Oregon, W. R.
