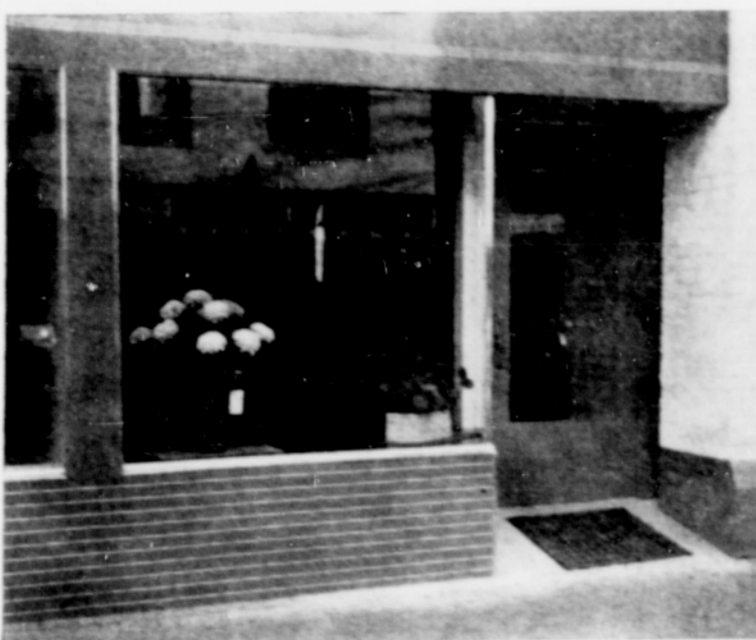

Red Tape May Tie Up Seeding Plan, Hare Says

Plan was expressed here Tuesday by William G. Hare of Hillsboro, ex-state senator, that fall rains will set in before the national government can "wade through the red tape" and take action on a proposal that upland burn country in Washington county be seeded to grass so that it will not become totally barren.

Hare's comments followed receipt of a letter this week from Senator Rufus Holman, Holman, who has been calling the national government's attention to the need of seeding burned over lands here, enclosed a letter from Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace in which the cabinet executive commits himself as greatly interested in the proposal. The plan is being brought up before the proper bureau, Wallace stated in his reply to Senator Holman.

"It seems futile to continue writing letters," Hare commented, "when all that is needed is an airplane bombing over lands here, enclosed a letter from Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace in which the cabinet executive commits himself as greatly interested in the proposal. The plan is being brought up before the proper bureau, Wallace stated in his reply to Senator Holman."

"If this land can be seeded to grass on the other hand, residents in burning over the land and work out their own social security," Hare said.
