

New Building Program for Christian Church Started

The captains are: Mrs. Margaret Elder, who gained highest honor by selling her full quota of sixteen blocks, O. W. Brown, Mrs. H. H. Stannard, Eldwin Watt and Charles Fleming. At the evening service they reported over half the amount pledged.

One hundred and eight members and guests were present for the basket-dinner fellowship at 12:30 o'clock. The annual meeting in the afternoon closed with a mortgage burning service in charge of Mrs. R. L. Putnam, assisted by Mrs. S. E. Olsgr, C. F. Swander, state secretary, and the minister, R. L. Putnam. In his sixth annual report the pastor showed progress this past year in every department of the church. Since beginning of his ministry the membership has grown from 166 to 288 resident members, according to his report. The treasurer, L. B. Hall, reported every financial obligation paid to date with a large balance in the general fund for the new church year.

Angie Harrington, "Building Block" treasurer, was re-elected to serve during the new building campaign. Miss Dulcinea Brown, Portland Council of Churches, gave a lecture in the evening on "Amsterdam," in which she gave an interesting recital of her experiences last summer in Europe while attending the world Christian Youth conference at Amsterdam, Holland.

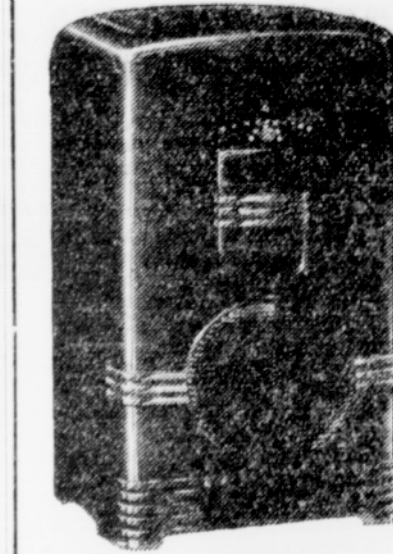
