Action Aims at City Ownership

The utility now rendering service to us at rates generally so profitable to our people as to be reasonable and fair. The question of installation of a municipally owned system will be submitted to the people and I will cheerfully abide by and assist in carrying into effect their decision.

Discussions Held
Little was heard of the water situation during the first few months of Mayor Rogers' office, but frequent meetings are to be held in the near future of the Argus and the city council. The question of water supply reached its lowest ebb because of summer drought conditions.

Adopted Recommendation
The city council in regular session on August 7 unanimously adopted a recommendation by City Manager Barney for improvements in the system and instructed either City Attorney Paul Patterson or the city manager to proceed to the Peoples Water and Gas company with demands that improvements be made.

In his recommendation, Barney estimated Hillsboro's domestic water need at 1,000,000 gallons per day and that the industrial need at an estimated 1,500,000 gallons. The total 2,500,000 gallons per day would set at the minimum level at which an adequate supply should rest.

Calling attention to the grave water shortage period during the latter part of July when the "water" was ranged as low as 12 and 14 inches per square inch, and to the absolute shutdown for 12 hours on July 27, Barney recommended that a pressure of 80 to 85 pounds per square inch in the city mains should be maintained at all times. He also advised replacement of present laterals with larger pipes to insure satisfactory pressure in all residential districts.

Dangers Pointed Out
The danger of financial loss by industrial concerns whose manufacturing processes should not be interrupted by water shortage and the extreme fire hazard in city with "out water" were also pointed out.

On August 11, the city manager, accompanied by City Attorney Patterson and Council President Anna L. Wells, appeared before the public utilities commission in Portland for a discussion of Hillsboro's perennial water system dilemma.

W. C. MacInnes, president of the West Coast Power company, also put in an appearance at the meeting in the interests of his company's contemplated purchase of the Hillsboro water utility. In his discussion, MacInnes assured the Hillsboro trio that if his company were to acquire the water utility, the city would either be supplied with an adequate system or the utility would be offered for sale to the city at a reasonable price.

Assurances Ignored
Declaring the city's position to be in no way connected with West Coast power, Barney went ahead

ditions and to partially perform their obligation to the people to provide and maintain a reasonable service, the city officials of the City of Hillsboro feel that steps must be taken at once to provide a water system that will furnish an adequate supply of pure water.

There is plenty of pure water in the Tualatin valley for everyone. There are several sources that could be developed to augment the present supply or to furnish a complete new supply. However, at this time it seems advisable to acquire the old system and to build it up to the desired standard of efficiency.

It is my information that in the past attempts have been made to acquire the water system by negotiation and arbitration, all of which failed due to such a vast difference in opinion as to valuation.

When negotiation and arbitration fails, the only other means the city has is condemnation.

The city council has authorized this last procedure but the city of Hillsboro cannot do this alone. Every resident every voter must cooperate if the city wishes to acquire and operate their own water system.

If we are to go ahead with condemnation proceedings it will be necessary that money be raised to defray the cost of court proceedings. The amount may be large or it may be comparatively small but it must be provided by you.

I ask every citizen to weigh the matter carefully for himself and to decide whether he or she wants the city to acquire and operate a water system that will be owned and controlled by the people of the city of Hillsboro, or whether he or she wishes to accept such service and such water as the water company sees fit to sell them.

The cost to the water user will eventually be about the same. We do not feel at this time that rates charged every voter must cooperate or raised, but we do feel sure that for the same revenue we can furnish more water and better water than is being furnished at present, or than we have any reason to hope for in the future if the system remains in private hands.

The ultimate cost of a municipal owned system has not been definitely estimated, as the cost of the present system cannot be ascertained until condemnation proceedings have been completed. However, we are able to assure you that the system will be self liquidating and will not need to cause an undue burden to property owners.

City officials have pondered this matter seriously and long. Perhaps you too have given it much consideration. If you have, I ask you to make a study of the situation. Satisfy yourself as to the course you wish your city to follow.

The city council has pointed the way by passing the above resolution. From now on your city officials can only carry out your wishes—Very truly yours, J. W. BARNEY, City Manager.
