Old Age Aid Applications Postponed

Applications for old age relief will not be acted upon for a period of several months, in compliance with state relief headquarters orders. Washington County Public Welfare commission members announced last week.

Ordered for an assistant has required a time share of relief funds that for it was indicated by Elmer R. Goudy, state administrator.

Public welfare expenditures are currently devoted to the aged. With the winter relief season, which was greatest demands made approaching rapidly, it is necessary to adjust means for conserving funds to spread them over the greatest possible number. Last month's old age assistance required \$448.136, with over \$1,000 cases on state relief Goudy declared.

Until the order of the state headquarters in changed the Washington county group will continue to accept applications for aid but will be unable to act upon them. All will be placed on the waiting list of applications.
