A PARABLE OF TRIFLES

A note in a recent issue of the Buhl Herald indicated that beans led the shipments from our busy station. It staggers the imagination to picture the number of beans represented by the 13 carloads that went out in the days when we pulled beans by hand and failed them out, even a wagon load looked impressive. Just as, a few years ago, farmers considered the bean patch as merely part of the garden, so for years they considered the poultry industry on their farms an insignificant trifle. But careful attention to these very trifles may now mean the success of the farm.

The ancient sages considered the destruction of the race by the invasion of great dragons or the ravages of mighty sea serpents. We are now beginning to realize that our chief enemies are the little things—weed seeds, insect invasions, and disease germs.

Meticulous care in designing and building the most trifling parts of any machine or of any structure will make all the difference between a masterpiece of craftsmanship and a disappointing "lemon."

A discerning analysis will often show that failure in business is due not so much to major blunders as to the neglect of little things. The careful attention to every requirement of the customers; the faithful, cheerful, and courteous attention to their smallest needs may mean the greatest success.

The difference between a strong character and a weak one is largely a matter of trifles. Faithful attention to detail, the practice of little kindnesses, care in speech and personal appearance, all conspire to make up the character of the truly great. The habit of fretting, carelessness in small matters, and carelessness in trifles will always characterize the failures.

The history of the divorce courts indicates that the important institution of marriage most often stumbles over the trifles.
