

Connell Urges Applications Through Salem

The annual rush of Washington county drivers to the sheriff's office here for license plates is unnecessary, it was pointed out this week by Sheriff J. W. Connell in a public statement which urged direct application for licenses by sending signed registration certificates to Salem.

Addressed to the residents of Washington county, the statement read:

"If you will send your properly signed registration for passenger cars and motor cycles together with a check or money order for \$5. to Earl Seel, secretary of state, you will receive your license plates before the first of the year.

This will save paying for a temporary license sticker and will save the bother of being stopped for driving without new plates. Applications for farm truck licenses and commercial truck licenses must be obtained at the sheriff's office and application for farm truck licenses must be obtained.
