

Traffic Safety Campaign Plans Are Discussed

Widespread active support for the traffic safety program in Hillsboro will be sought through a series of meetings before the various civic and fraternal groups of this community as a result of action planned by the traffic safety council at its meeting Tuesday night.

Letters will be framed and mailed to the heads of organizations during the next week asking that each group cooperate in the safety move by setting aside one meeting or more per year in the interests of this campaign. It was declared by Arde Dickason, safety council chairman.

The plan at present provides that each group supply its own speaker and plan its own manner of presenting the problem to its members. The committee organizing this phase of the traffic safety campaign is composed of Chairman Dickason, Chief W. W. Weaver, J. W. Barney, S. W. Melhuish, Al Brock and Sam Loy.

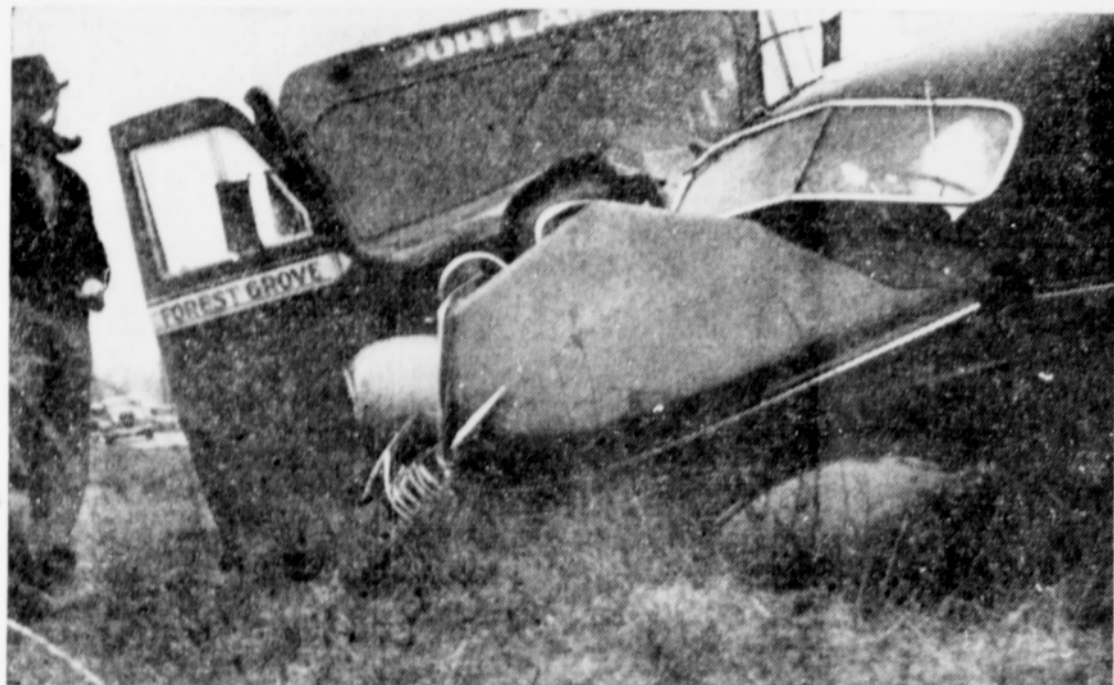

in all full time health departments for private physicians who wish aid in searching out their case contacts and in returning their delinquent patients to treatment.

The eradication of syphilis and gonorrhoea must be accomplished largely by the private physician. It is he to whom the infected person comes with his sore or discharge, and it is he who must render the diseased person noninfectious. The health department can only help. It should provide more freely available drugs, diagnostic services, follow-up for delinquents and case contacts, treatment of the indigent and an educational program. By the combined efforts of the private physician and the health departments, syphilis can be wiped out.

The occupation of venereal disease cases in Oregon for 1938 by per cent are as follows:

Labor, 25; skilled labor, 11; housewives, 11; loggers, 7; farmers, 7; unemployed, 5.6; truck drivers, 5; students, 4.2; clerks, 3.5; prostitutes, 3; salesmen, 3; seamen, 2; waitress, 2; housework, 2; CCC, 2; stenographers, 2; fishermen, 1; painters, 1; school teachers, 1; beauticians, 1; miscellaneous, 3.

From the above statistics it is apparent that the major venereal disease load in Oregon is among the low paid group of laborers, unskilled workers and housewives, and the information concerning these diseases much reach this group.

Appeal to Women for Help
"In seeking the help of all the people in wiping out the scourge of syphilis from American homes and life, there must be full knowledge of the necessity of continued treatment and observation by persons qualified for this work, not by quacks and drug clerks. Home and

school must explain and teach sex life. Recently while visiting the office of a doctor who for 16 years had routinely taken blood tests of each patient, the authors found a record of 10,435 tests with 2,798 positive for syphilis. This doctor had given himself a fine opportunity for helping his fellow man.

"Congenital syphilis is a pressing problem. With 15 per cent of the American Negro youth with inherited syphilis and 18 per cent of the colored women of child-bearing age infected, the problem is for all races and classes. The surest and best way to find syphilis in a pregnant woman is by repeated blood testing. Pregnancy destroys for the most part the external manifestations in syphilis, but adequate treatment early in pregnancy assures a normal child in more than 10 cases out of 11. Every woman is advised to consult a physician in the early stages of pregnancy so that she may be sure of giving her unborn child his rightful heritage of health."

CONTACT INVESTIGATIONS
IN SYPHILIS
(By Oregon State Board of Health)
"One of the principal objectives of programs directed toward the control of syphilis is to bring about a reduction in the attack rate of the disease. With the control methods now available this can be best accomplished by decreasing the average period of infectivity, through early anti-syphilitic treatment of persons newly acquiring syphilis. Establishment of easily accessible, well managed syphilis clinics may encourage infected persons to seek treatment earlier than they otherwise would, but a serious obstacle to complete success of this method is offered by the fact that many infected persons are completely unaware of the presence of syphilitic lesions during a period in which these lesions are most highly infective. This is particularly true with regard to females. Moreover, infectious cases of syphilis occur principally among youths and young adults and among the least well informed members of the community. It is of the utmost importance, therefore, that the syphilis control program should include adequate facilities for seeking out persons who are potential sources of infection in order that they may be brought under medical care and rendered non-infectious as promptly as possible.

"The most practical method of discovering potential sources of infection is contact investigation, which may be defined as the attempt to identify and bring under medical observation persons who have been in intimate contact with an individual known to have syphilis."

In Oregon contacts of all early cases of syphilis applying to health departments for treatment are investigated. Facilities are available
