Dr. W. Youngson Speaker Here on December 31st

"Pioneers, Yesterday and Today," will be the theme of the address by Dr. William Wallace Youngson, D. D. L. D. member of the Oregon Methodist society and north-west director of world service, at the local Methodist church on Sunday, December 31, at 11 a. m.

County People Return from 3000-Mile Trip

Weather was ideal until the rain and wind storm lashing the Oregon coast was run into, they reported. Missed the California storm by only two days, they said.
